National Memory Expert To Give Free Lecture Thursday

How a good memory can be capitalized, what a handicap a man of poor memory undergoes and how to train one's mind to retain facts and figures, will be told at a free lecture in the Legion Hall Thursday night, at 8 o'clock by O. W. Hamley, prominent lecturer and one of the leading memory experts in the nation.

In a sense, the lecture is being sponsored by the American Legion.

Inability to memorize the lessons in his text-books forced Hamley out of the public school because he could not keep up with his class, but pride and perseverance eventually made him the acknowledged memory expert of the world. More than that, it enabled him to be of incalculable service during the war, making mental inventories of supply depots and military observations, and carrying in his mind long code messages which could not be entrusted to writing. As a specimen of his powers in this line he recently committed to memory at one reading fifteen hundred unrelated words which he then repeated, miscounting but one.

NEW MILL WILL BE OPERATING BY APRIL FIRST

Interview Directors Details of Chiloquin Lumber Company Plant

CHILOQUIN, Ore., Jan. 31.—(Special)—A crew of men are now at work on the construction of the new mill of the Chiloquin Lumber Co., south of this city. The new mill will replace the one destroyed by fire early last spring. In an interview with Mr. E. A. Blockinger, president of the company, today, the following description of the new mill was obtained.

The sawmill will be 38 by 136 feet, of extra standard construction, 14 by 14 foot posts on the first floor, 10 by 10 on the sawing floor. The timber to be used in the construction will be all of red fir, about 175,000 feet being necessary. About 25,000 feet of long timbers are being purchased outside, the company using their own fir timber.

Equipment Described
The mill equipment will consist of a single band 8-foot saw, a 60-inch carriage, a 14-inch shotgun feed, a 56-inch edger, 5-saw trimmer.

All the conveyor machinery is being supplied jointly by the Prescott Company of Menominee, Michigan, and The Klamath Falls Iron and Steel Works.

The deck stop and nigger are all electrically operated, there being 400-motor horsepower in the mill, of which the band mill motor is 200 horsepower. These will be mostly of the Alice-Chalmers, and the General Electric motors.

The old boiler plant will supply the steam for the deck stop.

The band mill will have 15-gauge saws, 14 inches wide, and will cut 70,000 feet in 10 hours. On account of the late start in construction of the sawmill, the company expects to cut between 16 and 20 million feet this year. In the future the mill may cut up to 25 million feet annually, depending on the markets.

Later installation contemplated is a complete water system with standard tower and tank.

Plans for the new mill were prepared by Walter Beane, the Klamath Iron and Steel Co., of Klamath Falls. The sawmill builder is William Groff of Eugene, who has had 40 years experience in sawmill construction in Michigan and Wisconsin and later on the Pacific Coast.

About 40 men will be employed in the construction of the saw mill. When the mill is completed the total number of employees in the company's employ in the mill, factory and woods will reach about 200. A crew is already at work grading, hauling timber and making the preliminary work on the new structure. Concrete will be poured in a few days for the piers and then the carpenters will make rapid progress with their part of the construction.

Jim Parker will be charge of the cook house. Jim has a high reputation as a culinary artist, and his meals always "sit pretty."

Means Much To Chiloquin
The construction of the new saw mill means much to the city of Chiloquin and the decision of the company to rebuild was welcomed by our people who deeply appreciate the financial gain and increased payroll of the Chiloquin Lumber company will mean to local business men.

WAREHOUSE TO BE ERECTED ON SPRING STREET

administration is pursued, there will be a war in two years," he declared.

"I predict, unless public sentiment is aroused, that when congress is adjourned, Secretary Kellogg will withdraw recognition from Mexico. The arms embargo will be lifted. There will be revolution. Marines will be sent in to protect oil property. Somebody will get shot—there will be an over act. Then we will be at war with Mexico, and maybe with all central and south America."

Diaz "Yes Man"

Senator Wheeler described the Nicaraguan conservative president Adolfo Diaz, as the "hand-picked yes-man" of the state department, and said the Nicaraguan government was "safety-pinned to power by the bayonets of United States marines."

It is "impossible to stand behind President Coolidge in the crisis unless one had St. Vitus Dance," he added.

The excuse of "protection of life and property of American citizens" for United States action in Nicaragua, as explained by President Coolidge, is only "the classic mask worn by dollar diplomacy," he charged.
