

KLAMATH BEEF IN BIG DEMAND IN CALIFORNIA

Four Shipments Scheduled
to Leave for South
This Week; First Today

A small fortune in steers will leave the Klamath country this week for California where they will be sold to supply Los Angeles and San Francisco markets, it was announced late yesterday by Jack Hunt, local representative of the California Cattleman's association.

Ten car loads of steers—three tomorrow and seven next Saturday—will be shipped south.

Tomorrow's shipment is remarkable in that the shipment will go as far as Los Angeles. The three car loads were purchased by the Wilson Packing company of Los Angeles from C. J. Laird, prominent Klamath rancher. The steers were fattened in the Merrill district with cotton cake and barley.

Three car loads of steers from W. C. Dalton ranch, two car loads from the F. F. McCredie ranch and two car loads of yearling steers from the D. O. Williams ranch will be shipped Saturday to San Francisco markets.

The sales were negotiated by Hunt who also is supervising the shipments.

TEACHING BILL INTRODUCED BY A. M. COLLIER

Local Legislator Would
Tighten Restrictions
And Requirements

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1. (AP)—Representative A. M. Collier of Klamath Falls has presented a bill which would tighten the requirements for elementary teachers. It would practically eliminate the teachers' training courses in high schools and the issuance of certificates to those who had completed such schedules. After 1933 it would force a teacher to take 72 weeks or normal work rather than the present requirements of 36 weeks before receiving a certificate to teach. Under the present law one may obtain a certificate for one year after completion of a 36 weeks course. This certificate is renewable for one year. Collier's bill would make the board of regents of the state normal schools the authority for setting requirements.

Warm Weather Puts Crimp In War On Rabbit

A rabbit extermination campaign has been organized in the community. To make inroads into the thousands of "jacks" in the vicinity, it is necessary to have them congregate in a small territory.

Cold weather and snow drives the animals into the cultivated fields, to the hay stacks. The plan was to poison the hay and barley which the rabbits would

flock to consume.

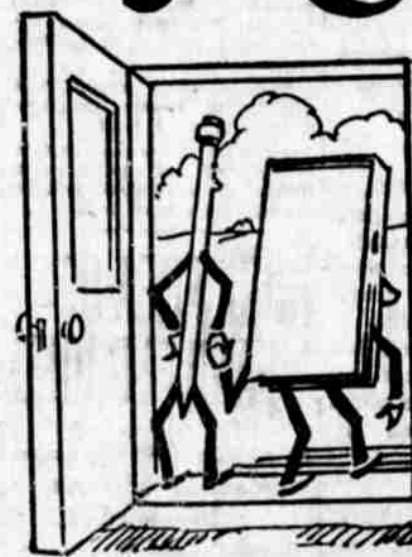
But with warmer weather, the rabbits are remaining in the sage brush and the only successful method is to place poisoned salt in the sage brush hills and flats.

To protect the livestock County Agent C. A. Henderson has advised farmers to place the poison solution in the hole of a two by four where the rabbit could get at it but the livestock could not.

ATHLETE MAKES CATALINA SWIM IN SECOND TRIP

Time Is Seven Hours
Longer than Young's
\$25,000 Success

LONG BEACH, Calif., Feb. 1. (AP)—Henry F. Sullivan, of Lowell, Mass., who conquered the English channel, but failed in the recent Wrigley ocean marathon to negotiate the San Pedro channel from Santa Catalina Island to California's mainland, declared today he swam from a point near the isthmus on the island to Point Vicente yesterday after 22 hours and forty minutes in the water. He said there were nine witnesses to the 20 odd mile swim.

Sullivan, who was being rubbed down in a Turkish bath, said his conveying boat developed motor trouble after he landed and the party was unable to get back here until 8 o'clock this morning. A boat sent out by a Long Beach newspaper accompanied the Massachusetts swimmer.

Sullivan's reported time was approximately seven hours longer than that required by George Young of Toronto, Ont., who landed at the same point less than 16 hours after he left the isthmus in quest of the \$25,000 prize hung up by William Wrigley, millionaire sportsman, for the first person to swim the water way.
