Judge Dismisses Chiloquin Case

Holding that there were not sufficient facts alleged in the complaint to constitute a cause of action, Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt, dismissed the second suit against a number of Chiloquin business men including J. W. Bartlett, W. A. Prian, R. M. Farmer, A. C. Gienger, the Chiloquin Rodeo association.

The suit was brought by Dick McGuire, John Bennett, L. N. Woodside and others on a bill which the plaintiffs claimed was owed them for services performed at the Chiloquin Rodeo association last July.

The case had come to circuit court on an appeal from justice court in Chiloquin.

A suit brought by Hazel McCarty against the association and several business men of Chiloquin was dismissed on the same grounds.

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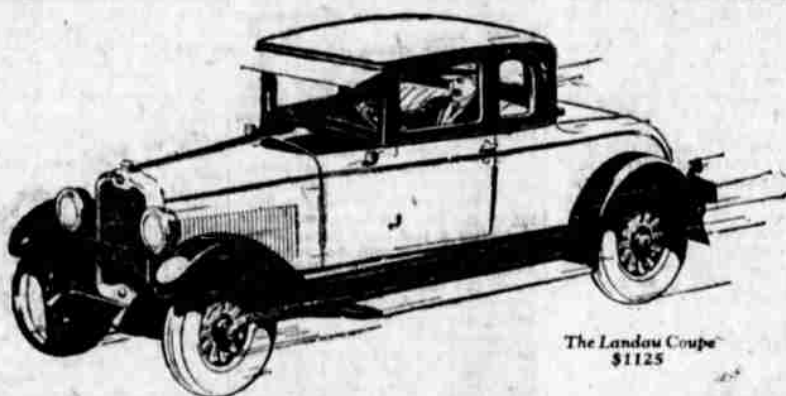
