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RULING TAKES SPICE OUT OF BROWNING CASE

Rebuttal Starts This
Morning; Spectators
Are Disappointed

COURT HOUSE, White Plains N. Y. Jan. 31. (AP)—Edward West Browning, New York real estate man and center of interest in his separation suit with Frances Heenan Browning, opened his rebuttal today of his wife's cruelty charges.

A court ruling, however, kept much of the expected sensation out of today's hearing.

Two letters written by his young wife to girl friends prior to his marriage were ruled out as evidence by Supreme Court Judge Senger, as being irrelevant to what happened during the marriage of the real estate man and the 16 year old girl.

Thousands who had crowded into the court room expecting to hear the trial's most outspoken testimony, stood up in the halls or jammed the court room to listen to testimony far from exciting.

Before noon six witnesses had been called, four of whom took up the allegations that Browning had suggested to Marian Tussey, girl friend of Mrs. Browning, that she "try to recollect something adverse to Mrs. Browning prior to her marriage." Miss Tussey herself testified that Browning had asked her if she had not seen Mrs. Browning before her marriage act improperly. She said she had denied that she had seen "Peaches."

Buddy Croner, his wife, and a house maid who lives at his home in New York, testified of a visit Mr. Browning had paid to the Croner place, where Croner is landlord for the apartment in which Miss Tussey resides.

Croner admitted on cross examination that he had called Browning voluntarily after he had learned that Miss Tussey knew Mrs. Browning but he denied he had received any money for his information, except ten dollars paid him for being subpoenaed twice. His wife said a man who accompanied Mr. Browning did what talking was done on the occasion of Mr. Browning's visit, but that Mr. Browning "just sat there in chair and didn't open his mouth."

The housemaid said she had left the room and hadn't heard anything.

Two Badly Hurt In Auto Wrecks

ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 1. (AP)—Carl Gallbreath of Riddle and R. Branson, local railroad telegraph operator, are in the local hospital suffering from back injuries in automobile wrecks. Mr. Gallbreath was paralyzed from the waist down when the car in which he was a passenger struck the guard rail at the Dillard bridge. The manner in which he was thrown forward caused a spinal injury which resulted in complete paralysis temporarily, but he has regained the use of his arms, although his legs are still paralyzed. He is expected to eventually recover. Mr. Branson was hurt when his car skidded and turned over near Oakland. Although his back is badly wrenched and he will be in the hospital for some time, yet his condition is not thought to be serious.

Chinese Loot Foreign Homes

SHANGHAI, Jan. 31. (AP)—Dispatches from the upper Yangtze today reported new disorders and looting of foreign property.

Word from Changsha, capital of Huan province, said mobs broke into and looted three of the British firms there and that the treasurer and a doctor of Yale in China college there had been imprisoned.

All available foreign vessels at Yehang, chiefly Italian and Swedish owned, were commandeered for the movement of nationalist troops down the river. The engines of two British steamers at Ichang were dismantled to prevent commandeering. One Italian ship loaded with nationalist troops has arrived in Hankow.

BILL HITS AT OFFICERS WHO SHOOT TO KILL

Astoria Law-Maker Introduces Measure in State Legislature

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Ore., Feb. 1. (AP)—With the view of protecting citizens from shooting by officers, Representative Jas. Mott, Astoria, has a measure that would automatically result in one being charged with manslaughter should he, in making an illegal search or arrest, kill someone.

Mott's bill would also make an

officer liable to a fine of from \$100 to \$500 or to sentence of from thirty days to one year in the county jail, or both fine and imprisonment, in case of conviction of false imprisonment, illegal search or seizure, entrapment, or for the use of firearms in making illegal search or seizure.

Mott explains that the bill in no way takes away an officer's power where he is carrying out his legal duty, but that it simply provides penalties for one performing an illegal act.

COUNT WILL BE REUNITED WITH HEIRESS WIFE

Reconciliation Has Blessing of Wealthy Father-in-Law, Report Says

NEW YORK, Feb. 1. (AP)—Count Ludwig Salm and his wife, the former Millicent Rogers, soon will be reunited, says the New York Daily News today. The reunion will have the blessing of H. M. Rogers, Standard Oil millionaire and Mrs. Rogers.

Count Salm and his attorney, Herman B. Goodstein, the News says, sailed Saturday for Paris where they will meet the Countess, Duchess Croix, aunt of the count and close friend of the countess, will be mediator, the News asserts.

Reports of the reconciliation have been confirmed by Baron Alfred J. Von Hottel, boyhood friend and confidante of Count Salm, the News states.

Peter, infant son of the couple, will be sent to Europe to his parents by Mr. Rogers within the next two months. When the reunion is completed the family will return to reside in America, says the News.

Rogers and the count have entered into a legal agreement in settlement of the case. Among the conditions are that none of the parties shall talk to newspapers, that Mr. and Mrs. Rogers will not interfere in the domestic life of the count and his wife, that the count shall become an American citizen, and that he shall prove that he is financially independent.

A separation suit brought by the count was continued in court here several weeks ago.
