NEW INDUSTRY TO OPEN HERE

Charles B. House to Capitalize on Patent Shock Absorber Immediately

A new manufacturing enterprise will soon make its debut in Klamath Falls with the announcement of Charles B. House, that he has secured United States and Canadian patent rights on an automobile shock absorber. The invention was completed last summer by House and plans are to start manufacturing here this month.

House's Cushion Spring Shock-le is the name by which the new invention will be known. When in full operation Mr. House expects to turn out at least 160 patented shock absorbers daily in the local plant on South Sixth.

After he had given the shackles a thorough tryout, Mr. House decided to apply for the patent

which promises to take a prominent place among the leading automotive accessories in the country.

Charles House, Jr., son of Mr. House will be in charge of the Canadian branch which will be in operation sometime before July, when the patent rights will expire.

Orders for several hundred sets have been received by Mr. House from residents of Klamath Falls and inquiries from all parts of the country relative to the device have been received.
