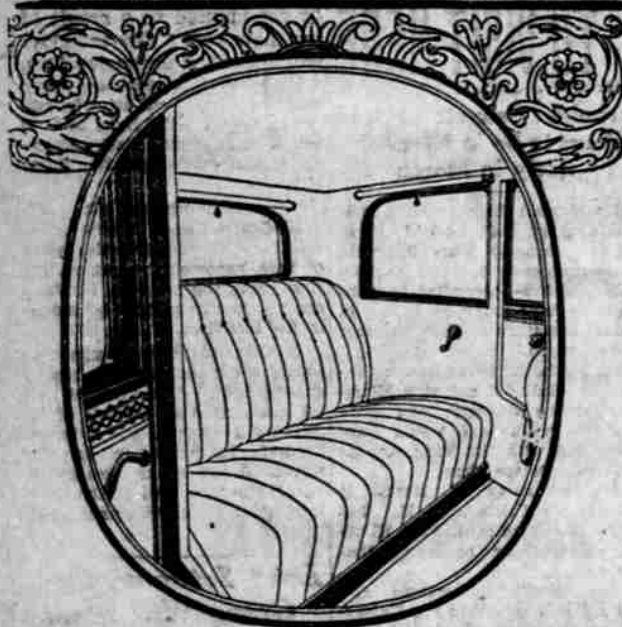

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 12. (AP)—John H. McNary was born in Marion county, Oregon, of pioneer parents.

He was admitted to the bar in 1894 and in 1904 was elected prosecuting attorney for the old third judicial district, comprising Marion, Linn, Yamhill, Polk and Tillamook counties, serving until January 1, 1912.

After retiring from the office of prosecuting attorney he and his brother, Charles L. McNary, became associated in the practice of law. This partnership continued until May, 1917, when Charles L. McNary was appointed by the late Governor Withycombe as United States senator to fill out the unexpired term of Senator Harry Lane.
