Trees Will Be Distributed To Klamath Farms

Under authority of Section four of the Clarke-McNary law, forest tree stock is being produced at the Oregon Forest Nursery at the Oregon Agricultural College, for distribution among the ranchers of the State. It was announced today by C. A. Henderson, that this planting stock may be used for woodlot, shelter belt, and roadside planting. It cannot be used for ornamental purposes.

The following stock is now available for distribution: Green Ash, Box Elder, Russian Olive, Russian Mulberry, Black Walnut, Honey Locust and Black Locust. Two-Year-Old.

With the exception of the Black Locust, the stock is two-year-old, averaging three feet in height. The Black Locust is one-year-old stock about eighteen inches high. This material is especially suited to planting in this section. This planting stock may be had at the cost of transportation from Corvallis. As this material is limited in amount, individual applications should not exceed 1,500 trees. The stock should be planted as soon as the ground can be worked. The trees should be spaced about five feet apart and thinned when they begin to crowd each other.

Applications for stock should be directed to C. A. Henderson, County Agent, Klamath Falls. Planting directions will be sent to each applicant. It is regarded as a very good opportunity to secure young plantings, and farmers interested should make immediate application, as the supply is limited.
