Pool Room Men Are Released Under \$100 Bail

M. D. O'Neill and J. C. O'Neill, owners of the Past Time pool hall, were released under \$100 bail each yesterday when they were brought before Police Judge Lem L. Gashagen to answer a charge of conducting a gambling game. Prosecution of the two men will be deferred until the return of City Attorney A. W. Schaupp who is in the south.

The men are charged with permitting a "fan-tan" game to be conducted in their place of business on Main street between Seventh and Eighth street.

Prohibition Enforcement Work Is Decreasing

Prohibition work—at least insofar as the state prohibition force was concerned—decreased considerably during the month of January. It was revealed yesterday in a report issued by Len Forncrook, deputy sheriff. Eleven men and women were arrested. 72 gallons of whiskey confiscated and two stills taken. Eight of the 11 arrested pleaded guilty and were sentenced a total of 35 days in jail. Fines collected totalled \$1,195 but only \$625 was collected.

WEED-KLAMATH
ROAD FAVORED

Dunsmuir Mobilizes to
Push Proposed Inter-
State Highway

DUNSMUIR, Cal., Feb. 17.—(Special)—At a meeting of the Dunsmuir Chamber of Commerce the proposed highway from Weed to Klamath Falls was extensively discussed. Among those who spoke on the subject were Assemblyman J. J. Murphy of Weed, Field Secretary A. B. Gray of the Sacramento Region Citizens' Council and R. D. Maclean of Yreka.

Murphy has a bill before the assembly providing for the allotment by the state highway commission of \$100,000 for the construction of the road. This is in addition to the \$21,000 to be raised by Siskiyou county this year. He spoke of his bill and also stated that the Oregon state senate had passed a bill introduced by Senator Miller of Grants Pass which urges the secretary of agriculture to use influence through federal aid appropriations to compel California to complete its

highways connecting with those of Oregon.

Gray outlined the work of the council he represents and urged that Siskiyouans join. He pointed out that this council can be depended upon to work for road in this section.

Maclean reported on the work of the California State Automobile Association and explained what aid it could give the project. G. A. Hutaff berated citizens of Siskiyou for complacently sitting back while others, more energetic, pushed things and go action. He cited the work of Redding in obtaining the completion of the road to Alturas.

In this connection Hutaff pointed out that there are a few individuals in Redding who are spreading false information as to road conditions in California northland. He urged Siskiyou not hold this against the citizens of Redding who, he said, are "as a whole, human beings and fine people if you get to know them."

Murphy and Gray also addressed the Lions Club of Dunsmuir at its meeting Tuesday noon.

"It has been hard to get work," he said. "I've been out of work lots of times when there was plenty of demand. People must think we're out at our house. We're just the same as other folks."

De Autremont blames private detectives, amateur sleuths and some federal men for things he calls "senseless."

Bothered By Sleuths.

"Why, Mrs. De Autremont and I have had no privacy in our house. They have come at 3 o'clock in the morning, and raised us out of sleep to question us. They have peered through our windows at night. They have written letters. I have lots of them, saying 'Hughie is with us. Where are Roy and Ray?' Do they think I'm a fool? I know who wrote them."

"My letters have all been opened and read before I got them. They have been careless about sealing them up again."
