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FORTUNE TO BE SPENT IN 1927 ON LAKE ROADS

Biennial Report of Commission Reveals Big Construction Program

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Feb. 18. (Special)—A quarter of a million dollars will be spent in Lake Co. during the coming summer on highway construction work, according to the report of the Oregon State Highway Commission in their seventh biennial report. The work involved is that for which contract was let during the past summer and late fall.

The work is divided into two main projects, that of the Drews Valley-Lakeview surfacing, grading of which was completed by Lake County forces last summer and that of the completion of the forest road over Quartz Mountain. On the first project, estimated to cost \$70,000, less than \$1,000 has now been expended due to early storms of last fall.

The Quartz Mountain work estimated to cost \$169,000 is much farther along according to the report but a large portion of this work remains to be done during the coming summer, approximately \$100,000 of the appropriation remaining.

An additional \$99,000 appropriation for the surfacing of the Quartz Mountain section is included in the tentative program of the Bureau of Public Roads. The appropriation is awaiting the approval of the Secretary of Agriculture and it is thought will go on record as planned by the Bureau.

Spud Cellars Erected Soon At Pine Grove

Construction of a potato warehouse with a capacity storage space of fifty car loads of spuds was assured yesterday with the acquiring of a small tract of land from A. R. Campbell on the O. C. & E. railroad by Jack Grafton, senior member of the firm of Jackman and Grafton company of Portland.

The warehouse will be located on the tract of land at Pine Grove and will compose two huge cellars, each cellar being divided into six compartments, and each compartment allocated to one grower.

"Work will begin on the cellars as soon as weather makes it possible," Mr. Grafton commented today.
