

Log Shipments Are Increasing

Gradual increase of logging shipments over the O. C. & E. railroad indicates an increase in activity of the lumber business which has been manifest the past several days.

Lumber shipments—small but

steady—are being sent over the line by the Campbell-Towle Lumber company of Sprague river. Fred Anderson, logging contractor, will ship 1,000,000 feet over the line to the Klamath Lumber and Box Company of Shippington. He already has 600,000 feet ready for loading. Isaac Lee will ship logs to the same concern from Hildebrand.

DR. P. W. SHARP BIG DISCOVERER

extracted from the blood of various animals. One part of it in 500,000 parts of sea water, it is proved, will start the life development process in previously infertilized eggs of the "parparatus" or sea urchin. As far as is known Dr. Sharp, Dr. Clark and the late Dr. Loeb, are the only scientists in the world that have done any research on "oocytin."

Dr. Clark and Dr. Sharp stress the fact that the discovery has nothing to do with the creation of life chemically, but that "oocytin" acts as a spark or trigger-pull to start the life processes into the development of individual animals from the egg.

White Substance
Oocytin is a white powdery substance and appears to be a protein, but beyond that there has been no success in specific analysis.

"This process," Dr. Sharp said today, "has been tried successfully on other organisms than sea urchins, but we are not interested in producing synthetic animals at all and are desirous solely in determining exactly what the substance is."

"Now that it is known that 'oocytin' will produce the desired effect in the case of the sea urchin is all that is of interest to us at present. Any further experimentation along that line would be morbid curiosity."

Discovered by Chance.

The original discovery of the substance by Dr. Loeb some time previous to 1909, was influenced somewhat by chance. In trying to find a specific catalytic agent which starts the development process from the life cell, Dr. Loeb chanced to try a blood serum and using the eggs of a sea urchin he met with success.

Dr. Clark and Dr. Sharp following up this revelation, succeeded in isolating from blood the substance, giving it the name of "oocytin."

Found in Animals.

Experiments have shown the substance to be present in varying quantities in the blood of many animals, although the highest per centage is found in the blood of fowls. It is present in both male and female, but that taken from the male seems to be more powerful than the female. So concentrated is the form of

"oocytin" that only 2-10th to 7-10th of a gram can be taken from ten gallons of blood depending upon the source of the blood itself.

Timber Owners Fight.
A fight has been waged by timber owners who refused to use the Edgar and Cullison cruise.

The resolution, which brings the matter to a head, passed the court unanimously today after the members had looked up the law as to their rights in the matter.

The Resolution.

WHEREAS, the county court of Klamath county, Oregon, has heretofore caused approximately three hundred thousand acres of privately owned timber land in said county, to be reassessed for purposes of taxation, and

WHEREAS, said reassessment has shown an increase of approximately six hundred million feet of merchantable pine timber, which should be on the tax roll, but is not now assessed, and

WHEREAS, it is provided by the statutes of the state of Oregon, that when any property has been discovered which has been omitted from the tax roll, the official having charge of the tax roll can be compelled by mandamus to put such omitted property on the tax roll, now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that a demand is hereby made of the County Assessor of Klamath county, Oregon, that he place the said cruise of said privately owned timber lands in the county, showing the said increase of approximately six hundred million feet of timber on the tax rolls of the county, and if the said Assessor refuses to put said timber cruise on the tax rolls, that mandamus proceedings to compel him to do so, be instituted forthwith by this court against the said W. T. Lee, County Assessor, under the said provisions and powers given by the statutes of the state to compel omitted property to be put on the tax rolls and assessed. The clerk of this court is directed to transmit a copy of this resolution forthwith to the
