A Mission-Retreat, beginning next Sunday morning, February 27th, and ending the following Sunday, March 6th, will be observed at Sacred Heart Church, according to an announcement made today. The missionary will be by the Rev. Father Thomas J. Brady, Missionary of the Diocese of Baker City.

The order of the Mission-Retreat on week days is as follows: Morning masses at 6:30 and 8:00 o'clock. A brief meditation will be given after each mass. At 11:00 a. m. there will be given brief meditation followed by the daily examination of conscience. At 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, the Stations of the Cross and congregational singing will be conducted by the missionary. At 7:30 in the evening the Rev.
