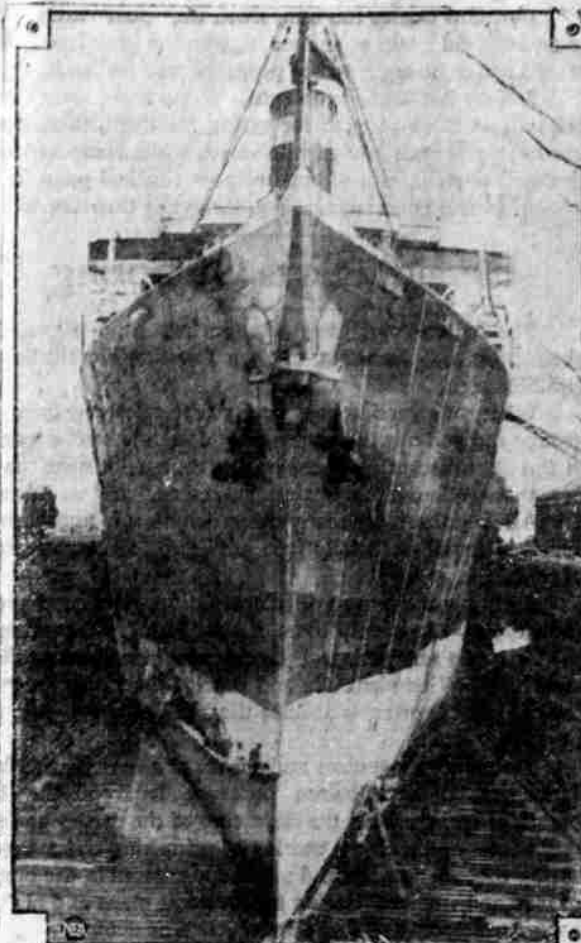
Committees Named—

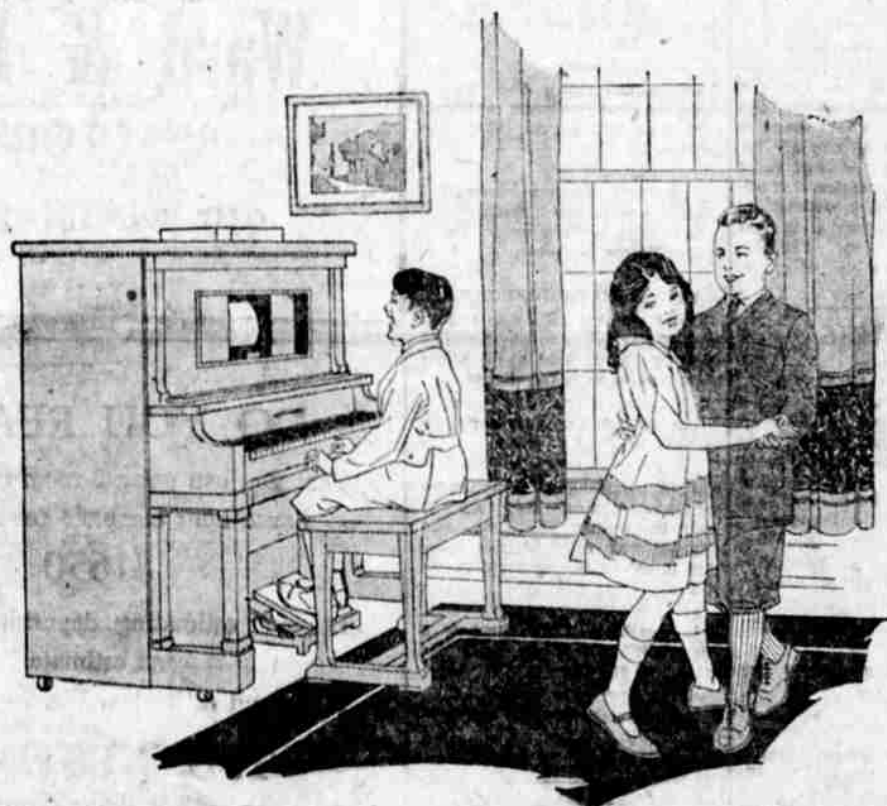
