

Liquor Source Believed Cut Off Yesterday

Arrest of S. E. Heasig and Arthur Jones and confiscation of a large still by L. O. Shirley and Louis Mueller, Klamath officers yesterday afternoon, has cut off one of the main supplies of liquor for Klamath Falls, in the belief of local authorities.

The still was discovered on a dairy farm at Klamath Hot Springs, just south of the Oregon-California state line. Its capacity was 250 gallons. One hundred and five gallons of moonshine whiskey, 2600 gallons of moonshine mash and other moonshining equipment was confiscated.

Arresting officers stated that the liquor tested 160 proof and that bootleggers bought it and then mixed it with distilled water.

Heasig and Jones will be prosecuted in Dorris, Calif., from where the search warrant was issued.

"The still has undoubtedly been the source of a great deal of liquor being shipped into Klamath Falls," L. Mueller said today.

Heasig according to Mueller, conducted a dairy farm in connection with his purported moonshining activities, and fed the used mash to his 20 cows.

GOLDEN BEARS COAST CHAMPS

University of Oregon Defeated by California; Webfooters Look Stale

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 5.—(AP)—The Golden Bears of the University of California roused away with the championship of the Pacific coast intercollegiate basketball conference last night, leaving the University of Oregon hoop hopefuls on the short end of a 33 to 21 score.

The Oregon team looked stale on the floor, as compared to the invaders. Diminutive "Swede" Westergren, Oregon guard and Scott Milligan, forward, were "fighting it up," but the rest of the team seemed unable to work up the enthusiasm the fans called for.

The Californians took the lead at the start of the game, and were never headed. An occasional Oregon spurt served only to cut down the California lead slightly from time to time, but the final outcome was never in doubt.

Shooting was erratic on the part of both teams. The Californians shot 71 times and connected for 14 field goals. Oregon tried 49 times, and made nine of the shots good.

California made five out of eight foul shots, while Oregon made but three out of 14 attempts.

The game decided the championship, since California had won the game of the play-off series. The third game scheduled for tonight in case of a tie, will not be played.

in the darkness. It was snowing and blowing hard.

"Do you know who that was in the brush?" Shirley said. "It was that preacher, Petelle, in Klamath Falls."

Then came the discovery of Petelle's overcoat in the machine, of letters and telegrams addressed to him, of his certificate of title and driver's license.

Fate Again.
But Fate was not through yet. Waiting for Jackson county officers, Mueller and Shirley at 5:30 a. m. saw a car speeding north on the Pacific highway.

They waved the car to stop. It did and started to back up in an effort to get away. It plowed into a snow bank.

Investigation resulted in the discovery of a large quantity of a variety of liquors and the arrest of Earl Plasted and Pete Fitzhugh on the charge of possession and transportation of liquor.

"After the Klamath Hot Springs raid, we weren't looking for anybody," Mueller commented today. "We were tired and anxious to get home and to bed."

It is possible, the officers speculated, that the two men in Petelle's car saw the moonshine still on the outside of the officer's car which they were bringing back to Klamath, and, anxious to get away, speeded on a turn, skidded and overturned.

HOSE USED TO SYPHON IN BIG LIQUOR THEFT

CHICAGO, Mar. 5.—(AP)—More than 600 feet of hose was used by thieves in siphoning bonded whiskey from a government warehouse to an apartment building. It was revealed today after police and federal agents had captured four men in a spectacular pistol fight and recovered thousands of dollars worth of liquor.

The four were William "Klon-dike" O'Donnell, who was held for a time in connection with the slaying of Assistant State's Attorney McSwiggin last year, Wm. "Far" Sammons, known to police as a gangland power, John Barry and John Davis.

Escapes Amid Fire.
A fifth man was pursued over the roof of the warehouse but he escaped amid pistol fire by dropping down a wall of the building which houses "pre-war" liquor valued at \$1,000,000.

O'Donnell and Barry were found manning two high pressure pumps, from which the raiders trailed the long stretch of hose to a battery of tanks in the apartment building. The tanks already had received whiskey which federal agents estimated was worth \$200,000.

Bluffard, claiming to be residents of Crescent City, Calif., arrested with a cargo of moonshine, they aver was intended for consumption in their home town, plead guilt in the justice court at Jacksonville this morning. Sentence will be passed later.

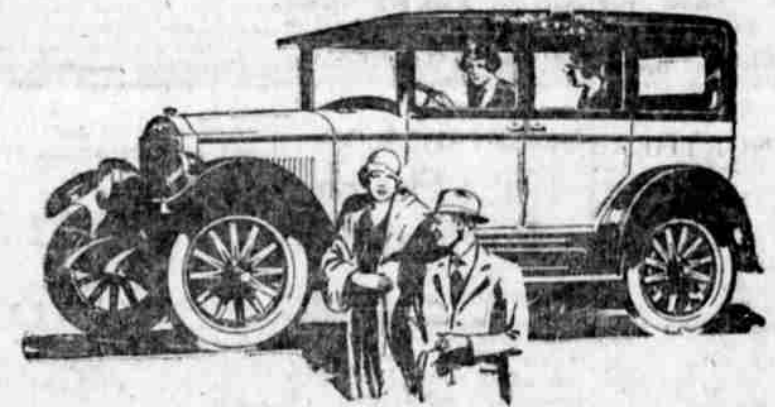
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
