Perry Robinson has leased another piece of land from the Adams ranch, that adjoining the P. L. Pope ranch and will put in potatoes. He also expects to purchase this land.

Max Hartierode of Merrill, has a piece on the west side of the highway of the Adams ranch and will put in some potatoes. In fact a great many of the ranchers will have in some potatoes.

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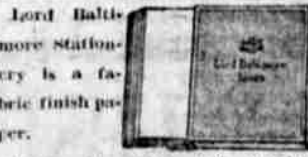
