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LITA GREY CHAPLIN



Lita Grey Chaplin Turns To Screen For Livelihood; Says She Won't Be "Starved Out"

LOS ANGELES, March 16.—Lita Grey Chaplin, prevented so far by legal barriers from collecting alimony in her divorce action, is turning to the screen as a means of livelihood for herself and two babies.
The former film actress, who quit her role as leading woman for Charlie Chaplin to become the comedian's wife, announced yesterday that she would return to pictures within the next two weeks.
Mrs. Chaplin explained that she had been "starved" into the necessity of going back to work because of her inability to pay her household expenses.
Bills increase.
Since moving back into the Chaplin mansion in Beverly Hills, which she left last November when she separated from her actor husband, her household bills have mounted until she cannot find a way to meet them, she said.
She recently took temporary possession of the home under a court order. The house cost the divorcee \$3000 a month to maintain.
Mrs. Chaplin charged that the film comedian, who is now in New York, has refused to provide for the maintenance of their two children. The only support they have received since the separation amounted to \$100 a week, which, she said, came out of the personal funds of Chaplin's attorney.
Starve?
"Mr. Chaplin can't starve me out, although that seems to be his obvious intention. He has shown not the slightest sign of interest in the welfare of the two babies he declares to care for so overwhelmingly. There hasn't been a word of inquiry regarding their health since he left for New York. Neither has there been even a mere postcard of remembrance to the children from him. He doesn't know whether they are starving or not and apparently he absolutely does not care a jot, since he has failed to advance anything at all directly to maintain them or even provide them with food," Mrs. Chaplin said.
Offers of motion picture and vaudeville contracts have been pouring in on Mrs. Chaplin since she filed suit for divorce. These at first were rejected. An offer of \$2,500 a week and film royalties for the appearance of herself and children in a motion picture was flatly turned down. The babies will not be permitted to enter the movies. Vaudeville contracts likewise were refused because Mrs. Chaplin would be kept away from her children.
Mrs. Chaplin said she and her babies have been living on money advanced by friends and relatives for the last three and a half months.

Wishard Tells of Klamath Weather

So much rain and snow have fallen in Klamath and Lake counties during the winter that the dried-up lakes are coming back, reports H. L. Wishard, irrigationist of Klamath Falls, who is at the Imperial. "In November we had 8.7 inches of rain," explains Mr. Wishard, "whereas during a

year our annual precipitation is 13 inches. So it looks as though we have had far more than our share. All the reservoirs are full and are the lakes. Goose lake has come back and so have the innumerable small lakes in Lake county. This is wonderful for the range and the cattlemen who have been worried about water shortage. There has been so much rain and now that no one need feel concern about water for coming year. The irrigation projects

in Klamath have always had an abundance of water, but now there is water everywhere. This may not mean much to people in the Willamette valley where rains are common, but out in eastern and southern Oregon moisture means everything."—Oregonian.
