Seed Potatoes To Be Dipped; Four Machines

Instead of the one potato dipping machine which served Klamath potato growers last year, there will be four this year.

And instead of 5000 sacks of seed potatoes being dipped in the formaldehyde solution—which grows against potato disease and tends to increase the production—there will be over 10,000, according to word received at the county agent's office.

Two dipping machines have been secured by Mr. Laki spud growers; one by Hanley growers; and the machine used last year will be used by Pine Grove growers.

Big Loss
Flames quickly spread to the I. O. O. F. building, the Walter Price Inc. store, grocery, drygoods, feed and general merchandise business, being on the lower floor, and then to the Service Garage owned by Riley L. Garrison. The loss, which will run into thousands of dollars, includes several automobiles in the Churchill garage, as well as equipment, a large amount of stock in the general store, and dishes, silverware and other property of the Rebekah and I. O. O. F. lodges in the hall over the Price store, much stock and practically all the fixtures of the Price store and the service garage equipment and building.

When it was seen that the whole town was endangered by the fire sweeping through the three frame buildings, the service garage was dynamited, to prevent a spread of the blaze to the remaining buildings. It was then that Billy Estes, son of W. E. Estes, barber at Marcola, and Lucene Miles were injured. The boy regained consciousness later in the morning, according to report from the hospital, and his condition is reported as fair.
