BIG SHORTHORN SALE WILL BE HELD APRIL 5

Indication of Revived Cattle Market; Business Has Been Poor

Shorthorn sales were abandoned for a number of years due to the sluggish condition of the cattle business, but now there is an indication that cattle are better, for Frank Browne, secretary of the Shorthorn Breeders' association, has announced a big Shorthorn sale for April 5th in Portland.

The breeders' Journal says regarding the sale:

"An announcement of more than passing interest is that made by Frank Browne, representing our Northwest Shorthorn breeders, that a spring consignment sale of registered Shorthorns will be held at the Pacific International pavilion on April 5th. This is the first event of this kind in four years. It is rather remarkable that, after so many consecutive years of Portland Shorthorn sales, it should have been necessary to discontinue from 1923 to 1927, and it is surely a reflection of the confidence of those engaged in the industry in the retuning of prosperity that it has been decided at last to resume operations.

"We do not believe that the undeniable optimism of cattle breeders and growers is in the least irrational. Recovery from the de-

pression has proven a long and somewhat weary task, longer and more irksome in the case of beef cattle than in that of any other agricultural product, but there are unmistakable signs that the journey upward already has commenced and will continue in the same direction for several years to come. Even those observers that are least inclined to unthinking exuberance appear to be convinced that these conditions which in general, make for sound and profitable business are now in evidence on all sides in the beef cattle business."
