HARD HITTING FIELDER SIGNS WITH PELICANS

Marlow Will Wear Klamath Falls Uniform This Season

Hardest hitting, fastest fielding outfielder in the Southern Oregon Baseball league will don a Klamath Falls Pelican baseball uniform this year.

He is "Duke" Marlow, center fielder for Ashland last year, and conceded to be one of the outstanding stars in the southern Oregon circuit.

Tom Dillon, local hotel man, and "Red" Saunders, Pelican manager, signed up the sensational player in Sacramento yesterday, according to a wire to Lee Crawford from San Francisco last night. He will appear for practice in the near future.

Dillon and Saunders, who are touring northern and central California in search of likely baseball material, left San Francisco for Sacramento today and after spending several days in the Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys will return to Klamath Falls.

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 29.—Whether or not the Los Angeles Seraphs prance off with another Coast League pennant depends almost solely upon one thing—pitching.

Such is the opinion of the wise boys who make it their business to pick baseball win-

ners—and are right once in every seven years. This year it looks as if they have just about the right solution, however. At least Manager Marty Krug is spending most of his time worrying about his pitching staff.

"We haven't as good a club as we had last season," declares Krug. "But we have a team that will give the other boys a fight all the way. What we need most of all is two more good pitchers. The rest of the

club is as strong as ever, although we will miss Statz out of center field."

There is no getting around the fact that the loss of "Doc" Crandall, Jacobs and Statz was a severe blow. It would be a blow to any club. Jacobs and Statz have gone up to the big circus, the former with the Chicago White Sox and Statz lining up with Brooklyn. Crandall is with the Wichita, Kan., club this season.

There still are several possibilities for changes in the Angels' lineup that will have considerable bearing on their performance when the season opens. Krug is trying his best to get Jim Elliott, a good impudens, from Brooklyn, and he may get "Lefty" Brillheart, a southpaw, from the Cubs. Pete Scott may also come from the Cubs to strengthen the outfield. It's mighty nice to have a big league club in the family when one is in need of new material.

As things stand now, Wright, Hamilton, Pierce and Moss, who came from Brooklyn in the Statz deal, are the mainstays of the hurling staff. Mattow, Holmes, Smith and Weathersby are the most likely looking recruits but they aren't up to the standard required for a pennant winning outfit. Gus Sandberg and Truck Hannah will do the receiving, so there's nothing to worry about in that department.

Wally Hood, who used to be one of the best outfielders in the league, will be seen savorting around first base. He also will be an important asset in pounding out the horsehide. I might add right here that he hasn't lost any of his old hitting power.

Ray Jacobs, Brazil and Mitchell complete the infield on second, third and short, respectively. In addition, Krug has picked up Lewis Dotson, a youngster, who has been showing considerable class on first. Cox, who hails from Brooklyn, will replace Statz in the outfield with Art Jahn and Weis on each side of him. In reserve,

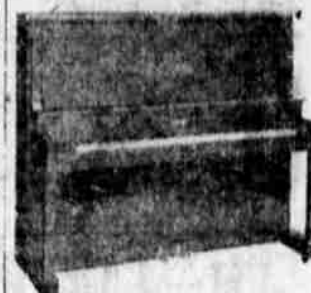
