He also gives this community all the benefits of the state chamber's colonization department, but in addition there is needed local work along the same lines.

It might be said right here, that the road question must be met if we are to have the lands settled, for roads are now a necessity and people cannot be attracted to the land unless there are good highways opening up the region. Dear Sir:—

I have noticed articles in your newspaper relating to the people dealing with outside mail order houses and which, of course, is quite worthy of mention, but you did not go far enough into the subject.

You have an industry in your district which that—and that only—has enabled you to make your city the most talked of place in the country, and that is the lumber industry. I wonder how many of your business men, when they plan building or improvements, give a thought of where the lumber comes.

Practically all our mills have a surplus of the finest of building material which for most purposes, is of a superior quality and of a higher grade than that being shipped in from the northern mills. The Southern Pacific Co. is buying ties in this district and as they are shipping them to their treating plant near Los Angeles we know they are not being used locally and with their research work on the quality and durability of materials we should not question the value of this timber for building purposes. Their inspector acknowledged a superior quality and grade to the northern timber.

You have some retail yards in your city which stock their yards with practically all, if not all, of their stock, from northern mills and if the business man would rather put his money in the pockets of the workers in Portland he should hardly feel badly if the worker here does the same thing. With the extensive building going on in your city if the material supplied from stock would come from local mills it would help both the manufacturer and the worker, as many more men would have been kept working than were compelled to lay off.

It was unfortunate for some of the local mills when Jack Slater decided to withdraw from the game as his yard was stocked with local lumber.

Your Chamber of Commerce is making the right move in giving their assistance to help the box manufacturers and they also ought to lend some of their valuable help to the lumber manufacturers as well.

I must apologize now for taking up your valuable time but I believed it worthy of mention and trust it will be received in the same spirit it is written, viz. for the good of the community. Yours very truly,
