EUGENE LOSES TO FAST FIVE BY ONE POINT

South Has Upper Hand in Basketball Tournament in Chicago.

CHICAGO, April 1. (P)—The south had the inside track today to take the national high school basketball title to Dixie.

Four of the eight teams surviving for the championship flight game from the land of cotton and although a hard luck draw made two of them opponents, tournament observers believe that one of the four smooth working combinations was destined to inherit the title won last year by Pittsfield, Mass.

Of the remaining four teams, two came from the north, one from the west, with Chicago backing one entry. Teams from the east and the Pacific coast have been eliminated. The two southern squads which face each other in one of tonight's games are Norfolk, Va., and Florence, Miss.

Florence and another of the southern quintets, Vienna, Ga., so far have shown the most finished team work of the entire field, and they were favored among the survivors.

Eugene, Ore., last night fell before the Maury high of Norfolk, Va., by the narrow margin of one goal—the final score being 14 to 43. The deciding goal came as the time keeper raised his arm to fire the final gun.

County Library Board Resigns

County Library board, appointed by R. H. Bunnell, just before he was succeeded as county judge by Dr. Fred R. Goddard, resigned yesterday afternoon.

Personnel of the board includes W. A. West, chairman; H. D. Newell, C. H. Underwood and G. A. McCarthy.

Following letter of resignation was submitted to the county court: Klamath County Court, Gentlemen:

The undersigned were appointed members of the county library board on the thirty-first day of December, 1926. It has

taken a few weeks to familiarize ourselves with the resources available for financing the library, to determine with the State Librarian and the City Library Board.

We believe a County Library functioning properly will be of great benefit to the county, particularly to that portion outside of Klamath Falls. In order to be of maximum benefit the services of a trained librarian will be indispensable.

We find that the annual levy for the County Library is only \$2500, which amount may be appreciably decreased by obligations and payments from the preceding year.

Even if the full \$2,500 should be available this year, it will barely suffice for the payment of a trained librarian and the

upkeep of the county library building, leaving nothing for the purchase of books and the expense of transporting them to and from the branch libraries which should be established throughout the county.

It is obvious that the most harmonious relations should exist between the County Court, and the City Library Board, and in the hope of effecting this result, we hereby tender our resignation to take effect immediately.
