Board Ships

Japanese civilians boarded steamships on the Yangtze, making ready to evacuate Hankow. About 100 French, Belgian and Swiss remained in the city. British and Americans took quarters close to the water front so as to be ready to leave at short notice. The Americans in Hankow number about 105.

Several heads of American firms applied to the American consul general for his approval of their remaining at their posts, but he informed them they would stay at their own risk.

Civil War

While the state of affairs south of Yangtze river, caused by anti-foreign agitation appears to be growing steadily worse, the civil war situation north of the great river, is becoming more precarious as the Cantonesse armies progress further toward the northern capital, Peking. For the moment the objective of the Cantonesse is Tsinanfu, capital of Shantung, and Tientsin, strategic railway center of the north.

Dr. W. H. Lytle Here To Check Rabie Reports

To investigate reports of livestock being infected with rabies from ravages of mad coyotes, Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, arrived in Klamath Falls today.

Dr. Lytle had not heard of the trouble on the H. M. Anderson ranch, near Chiloquin.

"But I will investigate it before I leave," he commented.

Case Will Be Given To Jury Late Today

Trial of Domingo Patron, Mexican, charged with murdering Jesus Munoz, near Modoc Point, January 20, drew to a close this afternoon. The case will be in the hands of the jury by evening, it was predicted.

Patron took the stand this morning in his own behalf today and denied complicity in the shooting of Munoz.

D. J. Hans and Charles Scavay, both connected with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company maintenance department, arrived in Klamath Falls today from Eugene to spend several days here attending to business matters.

Federal Warden Inspects Tule Duck Situation

George Youkin, deputy United States game warden, and an authority on fish and game life, is spending several days in Klamath inspecting the game bird situation of Tule lake.

During the height of the duck disease on the lake, Mr. Youkin was stationed here by federal authorities and conducted many experiments which have the U. S. Biological survey an insight into the situation.

Mr. Youkin resides in Sacramento. He formerly was an Oregon resident.

FOUR MILLION TROUT WILL BE PLANTED HERE

Four million small trout, from two to six inches long, will be released in Klamath lakes and streams this year, it was announced this morning by Percy Southwick, superintendent of the Crooked Creek hatchery and in charge of egg taking stations at Wood river and Seven mile creek.

"One million Eastern Brook trout fry from Bend, 1,000,000 rainbow trout of last year's hatch and one-half million rainbows from this year's hatch, are in ponds at the hatchery at this time," Mr. Southwick commented.

"Recommendations of Klamath sportsmen will determine where the trout will be planted this year."

Trout run on Seven mile creek is expected to begin shortly after the middle of this month.

Approximately one million eggs have been taken to date at the Wood River egg taking station.

Through Trains Will Pause At Kirk For Water

(Special To The Herald)

KIRK, Ore., April 6.—All fast passenger trains, service of which is to begin on this line April 17, and all through freight trains will stop here to take water from the new well and tank recently completed by the S. P. Co., according to information furnished by Patrick Maughan, who will be in charge of the pump.

Mr. Maughan came up to Kirk Tuesday and the first water was pumped into the huge steel tank Wednesday morning. This tank has been especially constructed to deliver water to the locomotives in the shortest time possible and with very little waste. The tank at Chiloquin which has formerly supplied all trains will now be used only as an auxiliary tank, not used by the fast trains except in an emergency so Mr. Maughan stated.

Game commission: J. N. Fleischer, Portland retained; Matt Corrigan, McMinnville; L. A. Wright, Union; M. A. Lynch, Redmond; Ben Dorris, Eugene.

Veach tendered his resignation from the fish commission a short time ago, but Patterson has retained him in office by refusing to accept his resignation. His term of office expires on June 1.

Fleischer and Corrigan represent district number 1, Wright and Lynch district number 2, and Dorris is the members at large. Corrigan succeeds W. H. Bauer of Corvallis who might succeed Harold Clifford of Canyon City. Lynch succeeds James Maloney of Pendleton and Dorris succeeds William L. Finley of Jennings Lodge. Terms of the new members will expire in February of the following years: Corrigan, 1928; Lynch, 1929; Dorris, 1931; Wright, 1932. Lynch and Dorris are both former members of the commission.

New Construction To Await Outcome Of Bonanza Case

So far as the state highway commission is concerned, it will not move one step towards connecting up the link of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway between Dairy and Lorenz Mill until the suit brought against the commission is disposed of one way or another.

This is the word received by the county court in the message given to a Bonanza delegation by William Duby, chairman of the state highway commission.

Citizens of Bonanza have brought suit against the commission for re-routing the highway. Former route was by way of Bonanza. The new proposed route would lead directly from Dairy to Lorenz mill and, according to state engineers, would effect an eventual saving in maintenance cost.

Suit was brought against the commission to stop the change in the highway route.

Bonanza citizens, on the other hand, are determined to proceed with the suit, feeling that they can win and force the commission to again designate the Bonanza route.
