THE "Great Blizzard" of 1888 had blocked railway traffic and disrupted mail and telephone service. Through the drift-piled streets of Boston groups of men and women made their way to the public telephone stations, anxiously inquiring whether the long distance lines to New York were still in service.

"People did not want a message, they wanted to talk," runs a contemporary story. "They wanted to find out where the other party was, if he was alive, indeed. ****It was the voice returned, the personal interview, that was especially valuable."

through his trousers and missed taking effect in the upper part of his leg by the fraction of an inch. Stephens grappled with Clark and disarmed him.

Makes Statement

Clark has been held in the city jail on an open charge. According to attaches at the sheriff's office this afternoon he has made a written statement of the affair, which amounts to a virtual confession. However, authorities would not release the statement for publication.

An inquest opened this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Earl Whitlock funeral home. It was being conducted by District Attorney W. M. Duncan and County Coroner Earl Whitlock.
