Pelicans Arrive In Klamath County

Soaring through the air like a flock of airplanes, magnificent flocks of White Pelicans—Klamath's patron bird—are at the peak of their annual spring invasion of the Klamath basin.

So white that they gleam like burnished silver, the stately, aristocratic, long beaked birds, have been arriving in Klamath in squadrons, in companies and in divisions.

From different sections of Klamath have come reports of their arrival.

"I saw scores of Pelicans in lower Klamath lake," M. J. Barnes, district game warden said.

Another report told of two of the solemn kings of wildfowl in upper Klamath lake. Still another described a magnificent flock that flapped their way up Williamson river.

The birds left Klamath late last fall for the southland. They are attracted to this country by the abundance of small fish on which they exist.

Another sign of the advent of spring is the arrival of the Western Grebe, a bird whose plumage was formerly sold on the market and which is now protected by state and federal laws.

TONKIN WARNS NEST ROBBERS

Multiple Thousands of
Game Birds Will Nest
In Klamath Lakes

Molestation of nests of game birds in Klamath will be followed by immediate arrest and prosecution by federal authorities, George Tonkin, United States game warden, announced late yesterday.

"Multiple thousands of ducks and geese will nest in Klamath this year," he said. "There are more ducks on Tule and lower Klamath lake than there was at the height of the hunting season. The ducks are beginning to pair off, and already we found one nest with nine eggs in it."

"To molest the nests of the birds is a serious federal offense and I advise the public to think twice before they touch the nests."

"Tule lake and lower Klamath lake are sights that one should not miss. The thousands upon thousands of the birds are a beautiful sight. Never before have there been so many game birds which have remained in the Klamath country to nest."

MITT FLINGERS WILL PERFORM AT CHILOQUIN

Triple Main Event Scheduled; Fugate Will Meet Harrington

CHILOQUIN, Ore., April 7.—A triple main-event bout in which the best of the Klamath country and a few two-fisted maulers from the north, will display their fistic wares, will be staged in Chilquin, April 14, according to announcement here.

The bouts will be staged by the Chilquin-Boxing Commission.

Johnny Fugate, 192 pounds, veteran welterweight of Portland, and Wilbur Harrington, 146, probably the most popular fighter in Klamath, will fight the last of the three main events.

Jack Crim, 148 pounds, Chilquin welterweight, will meet Ted Tanner, Chilquin, 146 pounds.

Earl Stolz, another welterweight, 145 pounds, will clash with Tommy Thompson, 142 pounds Ellensburg, Wash.

Pat McFadden will meet Mike Daly in the first preliminary.

Who Will Win?
Will Harrington's dynamite fist break down the barriers of age and experience possessed by Fugate? The red skin scrapper is one of the sweetest mitt flingers seen in a Klamath ring. He hits naturally and like a stick of dynamite. He is fast, game and on several occasions has delivered a sleep punch when the cash customers thought him out on his feet.

Crim, another Indian, is clever fast and of late, has been a willing fighter. He fights Tanner of Chilquin, a willing mixer.

Stolz meets Thompson.
Stolz, angular, fast stepping boy from Bend, has appeared in Klamath rings before and carries a wicked right hook. He will fight Thompson, who also has appeared in a Klamath ring. Even if he did fall victim to Harrington's terrific left hook, Thompson is considered a good boy. He hits hard, is willing and will take punishment.

McFadden and Daly, are the two best preliminary boys in the county. They have met before and their goes have vied with the main event for favor with the cash customers.

TRAP SHOOTING CLUB TO OPEN

Public Invited to Attend;
Many Prizes Offered
By Organization

Formal opening of the Klamath Gun club grounds and buildings, north of Pelican City, will be marked Sunday with the biggest all around trap shoot ever staged in Klamath county.

Prizes, dozens of them, will be offered by the club. The public is invited and the fact that a person is an inexperienced shot should be no deterrent, club officials say.

The new gun club includes three buildings and a large tract of land, ideally laid out for a trap shooting grounds.

Shooters will be arranged into five classes—A to E—and the prizes offered for class E are just as pretentious as those for class A.

Four major prizes will be offered for each class first, second, third and consolation. The so-called "booby" prizes will be as good as the first prizes.

"We want it emphasized that everybody is invited to come to the shoot," A. W. Schaupp, member of the club, said today. "Trap shooting is new here, but already Klamath is recognized as having some of the best shots in the county."

Sorbin Hearing Is Held Today

Preliminary hearing of Fred Sorbin, restaurant employe, who is charged by Mary Cooley with threatening to kill her, opened this afternoon before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes.

Final Details For Ball Club Are Determined

Matters of players' salaries, league schedules and other important preliminary features of the local baseball situation were settled at a meeting of the directors of the Klamath Falls baseball club last night.

Instead of splitting the gate receipts with the players, it was definitely decided to pay the players a regular salary, and Manager "Sandy" Saunders was authorized to sign up players for the local team, keeping his total salary limit to \$200 per week.

Study Schedule.
The directors studied the proposed schedule which was submitted by H. C. Williamson of Medford, secretary of the league, but it was agreed that several changes must be made in order to give this city a better schedule. The league directors will meet at the Lithia Springs hotel in Ashland next Sunday afternoon at which time a revision of the schedule will be demanded.

Tom Dillon was elected president of the local baseball club and W. H. Perkins was named secretary.

\$300 a Week.
The directors declared it would take approximately \$300 a week to run the ball club, and for that reason the drive for support funds must be renewed at an early date. This year a strict accounting of all funds will be kept and a financial report of all money received and spent will be submitted from time to time in order that fans and supporters will know exactly the financial status of the club.

stated that the raid produced "overwhelming evidence" that the soviet union was deeply involved in plots to overthrow law and order in north China.

WASHINGTON, April 7 (P)—Foreboding conditions at Hankow, more than 200 miles above Nanking on the winding Yangtze river, shared the center of interest in developments in China today with the attitude to be taken by the Moscow government over raids by Chinese authorities at Peking of Russian property within the diplomatic compound.

Rear Admiral Hough, commander of the Yangtze patrol, reported the situation at Hankow as "very bad" while another message apparently from him but transmitted to Washington from Minister MacMurray at Peking, said that the Japanese were preparing to defend their concessions at that city. This dispatch reported that a Japanese naval force of two cruisers, four destroyers and a gunboat had been assembled there.
