Siemens Interviewed

The peppermint industry which was encouraged in Klamath county a few years ago by John W. Siemens has sort of dropped out, said Mr. Siemens, who was in Portland yesterday. A good start was made growing the peppermint and it was demonstrated that the plant could be readily cultivated in that region. Since the Klamath experiments the Williamette valley has taken to growing peppermint and there are

sections in Washington state where the plants are grown. The oil commands a good price and is distilled on the same principle as corn likker, but the peppermint growers have a special permit to own and operate their stills. — Portland Oregonian.

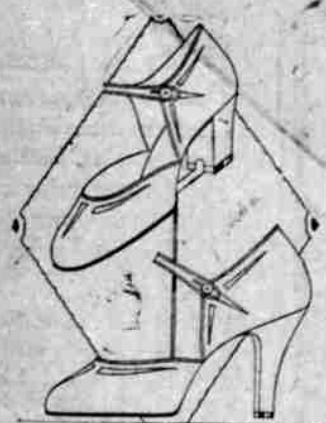
