Everything Set For Fights At Chiloquin Tonight; Red Skin Fans Bet On Favorites

Betting was heavy in Klamath Falls and Chiloquin today on the last two bouts of the "triple main event" fight which will be staged in Chiloquin tonight.

Red skinned fight fans have dug deep in their jeans and laid down hard cold cash that Wilbur Harrington, Klamath Indian, would defeat Johnny Fugate of Klamath Falls, and that Jack Crim, Modoc Indian of Chiloquin, would take the measure of Ted Tanner, Chiloquin.

Interest is at high pitch in the two fights, the Tanner vs. Crim affair because it is a grade af-

fair, and the Harrington vs. Fugate fight, because it means the making of the breaking of the popular Indian manner.

Chiloquin Ago.

The little community of Chiloquin has made the fight card a public enterprise. Yesterday Mayor Glenger and other members of the city official family labored mightily to dress up the surface of the macadamized Chiloquin-Williamson river road.

A special round-trip stage fare between Klamath Falls and Chiloquin will be in effect tonight. It has been announced. The stage will leave the stage office at Sixth and Main shortly after 7 p. m. The round trip fare will be \$2.

The bouts will be staged in the Chiloquin dance hall. It is possible that a dance will be staged following the fights.

The Chiloquin Boxing commission does not hope to make a cent on the fights. Their hope is to arouse interest in the fights so that they can put over good cards in the future.

Harrington's Test.

The last of the three six-round main events, is the most important. Wilbur Harrington, popular among Klamath Indian, has come to the cross roads. If he removes the formidable obstacle of Johnny Fugate, he will trudge along the road to ring fame. If Fugate defeats him either by decision or over the K. O. route, the panther-like red skin will have to start all over again.

Fugate is fast, clever, and undoubtedly is more of a seasoned veteran than his opponent. However, Harrington has a few pounds weight advantage and youth on his side. It should be a good fight with the knock out punch on either side liable to slip over from the opening gong to the close.

Of Crim and Tanner, everybody knows, grudge fight, pure and simple. The two young men, both experienced in the ring, have staged several cat and dog fights on the streets of Chiloquin. So far as is known, a woman is not mixed up in the antagonism. It is said that both men claim superiority, and that they are determined to find out who has the upper hand.

Thompson vs. Stolz.

Tommy Thompson, the windmill, will try to fathom the clever, dancing attack and counter attack of Earl Stolz of Bend in the first of the six round bouts. Stolz has appeared a number of times in Klamath rings and is rated as a good semi-wind up or special event attraction.

Fans will get their first taste of blood when the indomitable pair, Mike Daly of Pelican City and Pat McFadden of Weed, will tangle fists in the preliminary. Three times these boys have faded the main event and each bout was a draw. But such a draw! Both were so nearly exhausted and punch drunk that a good strong wind would have blown them over.

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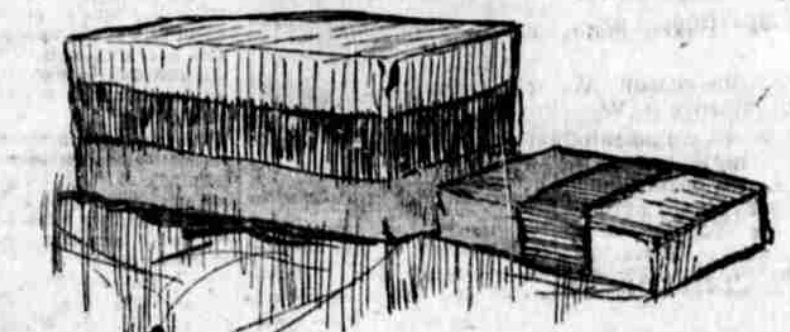
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
