MAKE TRY FOR TYPING PRIZE

Four Girls Will Vie in High School Contest at Ashland Saturday

Four girls will ably represent K. C. H. S. in the typing contest to be held at Ashland, Saturday 23, at 9:30 o'clock. Esther Veach and Janis Stanley will enter the advanced typing contest; Letitia Kirk and Ruth Compton will represent the beginning typists.

Fees and names were sent in to Ashland last Friday by Mr. Jackson.

The rules and regulations are:

There shall be two contestants, from each school for each event.
Contestants shall be regularly enrolled students carrying at least four solid subjects.
No one, ever attending a business college may enter.
No one twenty-one years of age or over may enter.

The senior division shall consist of those students who did not begin typing prior to August 1, 1925.

The junior division shall consist of those students who did not begin typing prior to August 1, 1926.

The enrollment blanks with entrance fee were sent to Miss Juanita K. Tarr, Superintendent.

The typewriting judges are Mrs. Elizabeth Jerome, Medford; Miss LaVelle Booser, Jacksonville; and Miss Elizabeth Pennington, Rogue River.

Mr. Carl A. Lodeff of O. A. C. has issued a set of specifications that all track-men must be able to at least equal in order to enter the Annual State Track Meet at O. A. C. on May 14.

100 yd.-dash, 11 seconds.
220 yd.-dash, 25 seconds.
220 yd. low hurdle, 20 seconds.
120 yd. high hurdle, 20 seconds.
440 yd.-run, 56 seconds.
880 yd.-run, 2 minutes, 12 seconds.

1 Mile run, 5 minutes.
Short put, 35 feet.
Discus, 95 feet.
Javelin, 140 feet.
Broad jump, 18 feet.
Pole vault, 10 feet.
High jump, 5 feet, 4 inches.

These are rather high average times, taken from results from all over the country. To win a letter or a place on the track team one should be able to clip a fraction of a second off each of these events.
