GRUESOME TALE OF MURDER BY MEXICANS TOLD

Passengers and Soldiers Mercilessly Butchered By Bandits

MEXICO CITY, April 21.—Survivors of Tuesday night's train tragedy in Jalisco state, arriving here today, estimated the total dead at about 100, of whom 46 were members of the soldier guard and from 50 to 60 passengers. From five to seven Americans were on the train but none were injured.

The survivors, who reached here on a relief train, said the bandits or rebels who derailed the engine and then attacked the train shouted: "Long Live Christ, the King."

The robbers the express coach of 200,000 pesos, but did not lock the passengers in the burning coaches. After robbing the passengers they ordered them to leave the coaches, which were then set afire.

Burned to Death
Some passengers and soldiers, however, were so severely wounded as to be unable to move. These were left within the coaches and were burned to death. Three wounded soldiers survived of the military escort. They saved their lives by discarding their insignia and posing as civilians.

The attackers poured a heavy rifle fire through the coaches after derailling of the train, which was bound from Guadalajara to Mexico City.

Basilio Manin, an Italian, was slightly wounded. He claims the fight lasted over two hours and that many of the passengers were wounded because of the military escort fought inside the cars until the rebels climbed in. Then the fight continued among the cowering passengers.

The rebels, he says, mercilessly butchered the remaining soldiers and passengers mistaken for soldiers. They did not leave until the arrival of the military train.

New Roads Are Planned Soon On Reservation

Between \$25,000 and \$30,000 will be expended by the Indian department on road maintenance and construction on the Klamath Indian reservation this year. It was announced late yesterday by L. D. Arnold, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation.

The program can be classified under three heads:
1. Grading of the Chiloquin-Braymill road.
2. Preliminary survey and reconnaissance of the Chiloquin-Beatty road.
3. Grading, blading and general maintenance of roads leading out of Beatty.

"The Indian service stands ready to spend \$9,000 on the much discussed Chiloquin-Braymill road," Mr. Arnold explained. "This expenditure is contingent, however, on Klamath county matching the sum, raising the construction fund to \$18,000."

"The thoroughfare should be improved as it is the only outlet for a community of lumber workers and farmers."

Mr. Arnold explained that if the \$9,000 available for this work is not expended before the end of the fiscal year, that it will be necessary to send the money back to the Indian service.

The proposed Chiloquin-Beatty connection would follow up Sprague river from Chiloquin to Beatty. A United States road engineer is expected in the near future to make a reconnaissance and survey of the project and it is barely possible that preliminary road construction will be initiated this year.

"Work will be done on roads leading out of Beatty," the reservation superintendent said. "These roads are impossible during poor weather and it is our intention to improve them so that they will be all-year-around thoroughfares."

The reservation road department has equipment on hand that makes it possible to put into effect the comprehensive road program.

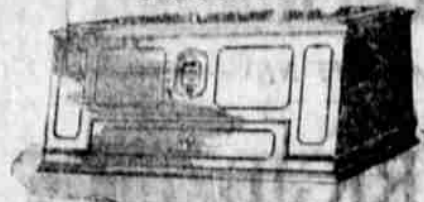
