 The alleged attack took place early yesterday morning.

Deputy Sheriff Louis Mueller and Deputy District Attorney U. S. Ballentyne investigated the case yesterday.

Knight, according to authorities, has just been released from the county jail where he has been held in connection with a stabbing affray near Chiloquin.

Between 500 and 600 Indian minors will not receive their payments; nor will their parents be given the money to hold for them.

In line with a policy inaugurated some months ago, Superintendent Arnold has been instructed by the Indian department to hold the payments for the Indian minors until they are of age.

The Klamath Indian tribe is the second richest tribe in the United States according to reports. Its resources are confined for the most part to timber.

Each year, reservation timber units are sold. Receipts for the units are subjected to the commissioner of Indian affairs who in turn holds them in trust for the Indians.

Twice or three times a year, these funds are disbursed and the red skins are urged to use the funds for development in farming.

Date for the disbursement has not been set.
