The Southern Pacific main line
south-west one mile to Link
River.

Overhead Crossing
The S. P. line at the point
where the Northern line will
leave, is on a high bench, a over-
head crossing will span the
Dalla-California highway. The
road will strike another high
bench on the other side of the
road, will follow along the ridge,
pass by the southern side of the
Palcan City school house and
will parallel Hanks and Locust
streets to the river.

Can Move Buildings
The agents of the Oregon
Trunk told property owners
that buildings could be moved
from their properties, that they
had no use for the structures.

There was little time spent by
the agents in negotiations. Home
owners were asked their price
and it was paid. One home owner
placed his price at \$5,000.
When it came to signing the
contract, he hesitated. The next
morning according to report, the
agents paid \$7,000 for the prop-
erty.

One property owner stated
that the agents virtually admit-
ted they were connected with a
railroad company.

\$15,000
F. Crowder, according to re-
port, sold out to the agents for
\$15,000.

When the Oregon Trunk was
applying for a separate line, its
plans called for entrance into
Klamath Falls from the south-
east. It holds a large terminal
site on the south side of Lake
Ewauna.

But with the mandate from the
I. C. C. making it necessary for
them to come into Klamath over
common user, they have changed
their plans, and are now accord-
ing to indications, planning on
entering from the north.

The grade down Link river
would not be too steep for rail-
roads.

W. F. Turner, president of
the Oregon Trunk was buying
up property in Klamath. He
stated that the Oregon Trunk
purchase all the property they
needed a year ago.

"There is absolutely no founda-
tion to the report that our
property will be condemned by
the Northern lines for railroad
purposes or that we are being
forced to accept \$5,000 for our
land in Buena Vista addition,"
Bert Harrington, Buena Vista
property owner said today.

"To anyone interested who
seeks further information, I sug-
gest that they watch the real es-
tate transfers which will be pub-
lished in the Klamath Falls daily
papers which will record the
transfer of lots 1, 2 and 3 of
Buena Vista addition."

This means in turn that Pax-
ton, a little switch on the West-
ern Pacific railroad will be the
objective point. But in reach-
ing Paxton the Hill lines will
penetrate a great big rich coun-
try which would be left bare of
transportation if the Southern
Pacific saw fit to go to Alturas.
But should the Southern Pacific
change its Modoc Northern point
of destination to Susanville it
would serve that rich country
leaving no need for another rail-
road.

So, comes another move on the
railroad chess board which adds
a lot of interest to the situation.

The talk also of late origin in-
cludes the statement that the
Southern Pacific will begin re-
building the Strahorn line at a
very early date.
