From Portland

LAKEVIEW, Ore., April 25—
With the installation of thru train service over the Cascade line through Klamath Falls, Lake County appears to be gaining much of the advantages of the new line in now being a full day closer to Portland by stage and train travel. Announcement of the contemplated installation of a daily stage service to Klamath Falls was made yesterday by Gordon Quimby of Klamath Falls who will shortly seek a certificate from the Oregon Public Service Commission for the new stage line which is to be placed in effect May 1st.

Stages will leave Klamath Falls for Lakeview at 8:30 A. M. following the arrival of Train No. 17 which leaves Portland the night before. Stages will arrive in Lakeview at 1:30 P. M. and return to Klamath at 2:30, arriving there at 7:30 in good time for Train No. 16 north bound to Portland at 10:45.

The schedule permits Lakeview business men to make a trip to Portland, spend the day on business there and return within 48 hours. Previous schedules have required from four to five days to complete the same trip.

The Lambert stage lines now contracting the mail on the Klamath Falls route are also contemplating schedule changes as soon as the conditions of the roads will justify making the faster time.
