WEYERHAEUSER MEN ARE HERE

(Continued from page one.) cause of his company's intention to build a mill in this section.

The wealthy timberman obviously did not wish his presence to be known.

Presence of the Tacoma timberman, particularly at this time, lends credibility to the statement that the Oregon Trunk railroad has decided to accept the common user arrangement over the S. P. lines to gain access to the Klamath basin country.

Largest Timber Holders.

The Weyerhaeuser interests are the largest individual timber holders in Klamath, owning 221,465 acres and paying each year approximately \$94,000 in taxes. They have purchased a large mill site on which they will eventually build one of the largest mills in the northwest. This site is located on both sides of the Klamath river, south-west of this city. The mill and auxiliary plants will be

located, it is known, on the south side.

Weyerhaeuser timber interests are hand in glove with the Northern lines. At the Central Oregon railroad case hearing before the inter state commerce commission held in Portland over a year ago George Long, vice-president and general manager of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. would construct a large mill in

Klamath as soon as competitive railroad service was offered. His company, Mr. Long stressed, had no intention of constructing a mill until it could be offered an alternative line. Mr. Long testified that experience of the Weyerhaeuser interests had been that without competitive rail service a large mill enterprise would be injured.

Significant.

"Mr. Weyerhaeuser and his party did not come to the Klamath country for the ride or the scenery," one man closely in touch with timber developments said today. "He came here because his concern is planning to construct a mammoth mill in the Klamath country, a mill that will mean wonderful development to Klamath Falls, that will allow this city's industrial growth to catch up with its boom growth."

It is said that the Weyerhaeuser mill and auxiliary plants—for the plant will be rounded out including lumber refining and other modern milling operations—will mean an added population to Klamath of five thousand.
