Mother's Death Told—

E. B. Marshall, prominent rancher of the Keno district has received word of the passing of his mother, Mrs. Lydia Marshall, at El Dorado, Kansas. Mrs. Marshall was 96 years of age at the time of her death.

The following from an eastern paper will be of interest to friends of the family in this vicinity:

“Mrs. Lydia Marshall, 96 years old, died last evening at the home of her son, Dillon Marshall, six miles northeast of El Dorado. “Lydia Spar Henderson was born near Thornville, Perry County, Ohio, on February 23, 1831 where she grew to young womanhood. She was married to Allen Forsythe, who passed away three years later, leaving her with two sons, Ambrose Forsythe and Allen Forsythe.

In 1859 she was married to Joseph Marshall, and to this union six children were born. When Mr. Marshall enlisted in the Civil War, Mrs. Marshall bravely took care of the home and family. In 1874 they came to Kansas taking a claim near Larned, where they reared their family enduring all the hardships of pioneer life. Mr. Marshall died at the age of 78 years at Larned, in 1904. Mrs. Marshall, made her home with her son, Dillon Marshall, most of the time since her husband's death. She was the last of a family of eleven children. Besides Dillon Marshall, she leaves two sons, William Marshall of Arizona, California; Bert Marshall of Klamath Falls, Ore.; one daughter, Mrs. Mattie Bailey of Hutchinson, fourteen grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. Mr. Marshall had not visited with his mother for more than 11 years.
