Young Men To Front

You noticed last evening in the Herald where the Great Northern has asked permission to carry on and build into Klamath Falls. This plainly means that Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, one of the young and coming railroad heads of the west, is not going to abandon the original plans of entering the Klamath Basin.

It is by far the best news yet received relative to the Northern lines entering this section. With Ralph Budd unhampered he will show the world what can be done in developing a new country, and it looks very much like that will be the program.

Of course the Interstate Commerce Commission will permit revision of the request to enter Klamath by dropping out the Northern Pacific and permitting Ralph Budd to come into this country with his railroad. What the commission seeks is competitive rail service here with the greatest economy in construction and operation, and the Great Northern will comply with all that the commission asks for.

To our way of thinking the news of the Great North-

ern coming in alone is positively the best news received in this city for many years.

Budd says in plain language that his road has sufficient money on hand in the strong box to build the railroad and he asks permission to use that money for the purpose mentioned. That is another new, frank and open manner for a railroad head to talk. We have been used to the old method of talking in terms of big finance when even a switch was to be built, but Budd takes everyone into his confidence and says "we have the money and the desire to build, now turn us loose."

What is the answer to be? Only one, and that is for the commission to urge the common user, but should that fail, then Budd must have the right to build into this city over his own route and with his own money.

The Frost Club

Who in the mischief started the frost stories about this Basin? And why do they continue harping on them?

Those who see a killing frost every month in the year see things that neighbors do not see, and with that kind of imagination and strong vision they should start a Frost club. No Hindu magician has anything on the citizen who thinks he can see frost every morning and awakens to the belief that everything is killed. The minds of such citizens should be collectively gathered into a club, and no better name could be given them than the Frost club.

After this let every real estate man and everyone else who believes strongly in this country find out whether the Frost club is operating before any deal is anticipated.

If a stranger happens within our gates who wants to trade a bunch of money for a good ranch, immediately hunt up a member of the Frost club and ask his approval. Ask him if he thinks it wise and let him spin his yarn about the frost that comes every month in the year.

After the Frost Club members have got in their work, take the stranger to County Agent Henderson, take him to the Hammond ranch, take him to a hundred places in the county and let him see for himself just how the Frost clubbers can lie and lie and lie.

Don't worry about the frosts. There is nothing wrong with this country. It will do its part, and the only drawback Klamath Basin has, if that could be called a drawback, is the Frost club liars.

Is it not the tree that has meant bread and butter to thousands of people in this district for many years past and many years to come? Our two chief industries in Klamath Falls are lumbering and agriculture, and will be for all time to come.

Further than giving attention to our vast wealth in forests it is in keeping that we should this week also realize the benefit of large numbers of trees in our city. The tree is a definite factor in the program of the "City Beautiful." Trees planted this spring in Klamath Falls will soon come to be looked upon as monuments to City Pride.

PARIS, April 28.—France has never sent a more brilliant delegation to any foreign country, in token of pure friendship, than that which is enroute to New York on the maiden trip of the new sea giant "France," the 24,000-ton ship of the French line. The start was made on April 20. A bust representing France, by Auguste Rodin, is being brought for presentation to the United States in connection with the dedication of the Champlain monument.

Captain W. H. Lampson arrived in the city last evening on his way to Klamath Agency and

Spring Creek, where he will investigate a location for a United States fish hatchery. Mr. Lampson is superintendent of the California fish hatcheries, under the department of commerce and labor. One of the principal trout hatcheries on the coast is at Hornbrook, California, which handles only the rainbow species. There is also a small trout hatchery at Sparks, Nev., and salmon hatcheries at Baird, Battle Creek and Mill Creek.
