Evidence Still Secret
There is no inkling as to what the defense will be and no word from the state, relative to the nature of its strongest evidence. A verile of 160 jurors, over half list residents of this city and Ashland, and including six women, all over thirty years of age, have been called for jury service. A special venire will be drawn Monday. It is expected that the selection of the jury will take a better part of the first week of the trial.

Hugh De Autremont is going to trial on the charge of slaying Coyte O. Johnson of Ashland, Southern Pacific brakeman, during the progress of an attempted train robbery in Siskiyou tunnel, October 11, 1923. Sidney S. Bates, engineer, and Marvin Sene, foreman, both of Dunsmuir, Calif., and Mail Clerk Daugherty of Ashland, were also killed during the holdup, the first two ruthlessly in the cab of the engine, the mail clerk when a too-heavy charge of dynamite was placed at the mail car door. Johnson, a native son of southern Oregon and powerfully built, met the bandits as he came around the cowcatcher of the engine.

been subpoenaed. The list of those called is withheld from the press.
Hugh De Autremont, the defendant and central figure, as the hour of his trial nears, shows no concern but the same jaunty confidence that has characterized his attitude since the day he was locked in the county jail. Smiling, confident and anxious for his day in court. He still talks glibly of all, and any topic, but the crime with which he is charged.
Ready For Crowds
Extra provisions have been made for the handling of the crowd and the accommodation of the press by the county court. The presiding judge will be Chas. M. Thomas.
The state will be represented by United States District Attorney George Neuner of Portland; Special Prosecutor George M. Roberts, a former Jackson county district attorney; District Attorney Newton C. Chaney, and Deputy District Attorney Neilson.
The defense will be represented by Fred E. Smith and David R. Evans of Eugene; John A. Collier of Portland, and Gus Newbury, pioneer criminal lawyer of this county. Attorneys Smith and Evans, accompanied by Paul De Autremont of Eugene, father of the defendant, arrived last night for the trial. Attorney Collier will arrive today. The counsel will confer with De Autremont in the county jail.
