MALIN TEACHER IS APPOINTED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON,
Eugene, April 29, (Special).—Appointment of Miss Cecile Bennett, of the Malin high school faculty, as Klamath county chairman of the Greater Oregon Club for the 1927 summer sessions of the University of Oregon, was announced on the campus today.

Miss Bennett was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1926, earning recognition for outstanding scholarship while on the campus. She plans to return this summer for work towards her master's degree.

The Klamath county group, of whom Miss Bennett will be chairman, is expected to be the largest this summer that ever attended a University of Oregon summer school. Under the leadership of President Arnold Bennett Hall, a wide range of courses and a faculty of national reputation have been arranged, with the result that summer study has a particularly strong appeal this year to teachers, principals and superintendents who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity to study with such authorities as Dr. George D. Strayer of Columbia University, Superintendent Jesse H. Newton
