The Needful Red Cross

Just a moment, friends and neighbors: Do you know a dire calamity has visited the flooded districts of the south? Of course you do. Do you know a calamity might visit our section of country any time causing tremendous suffering? Yes.

Then, ponder over your duty. Each of us knows without being reminded that there is one kind nurse always ready to respond and help us all in time of great need. That nurse is the Red Cross.

Klamath Falls' Red Cross chapter has responded to the President's call and is now seeking to raise five hundred dollars for the flood sufferers, the exact amount apportioned this county. It is coming in too slowly from as prosperous a community as we have here.

Perhaps we have not made ourselves plain to you. Suppose you had relatives in the flooded district. Suppose their homes and belongings had been wiped away in a single night and they were destitute and suffering. Would you not feel thankful if you knew the Red Cross was on the job caring for them until you could reach them, perhaps actually saving their lives.

That is the condition along the Mississippi river. You perhaps have relatives there. If you have none some one has. You may have relatives in the next place visited by calamity. Then, pinch yourself and wake up to the situation. Give something to the Red Cross drive and do it now.

State Election Is Mistake

On June 28th a special election will be held all over the state of Oregon to ratify or undo the work of the legislature—to vote on the Patterson-Pierce income tax bill, and to add further chaos to state affairs.

Special elections should be abolished except under the most dire necessity. They are expensive, they keep a constant agitation going when men and women would otherwise have a rest from petty affairs.

Dual system of government is not working out the best in the world—it has a follow up which very often means needless work and expense. The time probably is not far distant when the state legislature will be abolished entirely by constitutional amendment and in its place a board of control will act. Such a thing, we repeat, may happen. And it will be due to the constant special election following almost every legislative assembly, to either do or undo their acts. Voters will argue in their own minds that it is better to have no legislature than to be compelled by referendum to review everything of importance done by it. One step is almost sure and that is the less frequency of special state elections—some measure will be adopted to put an Oregon boot on the special election and make it harder to hold them.

Over in Walla Walla—the staid, church, school town of Walla Walla—two men fought to death with guns. Think of it, just think of it. How shocking. Must new and progressive towns like Klamath Falls, where crime is supposed to be rampant, show the old established settlements the meaning of true law and order?
