ROTARY ENJOYS DANCEY'S TALK

Legionnaire Pleads for Understanding and Less Superiority Complex

It has been a long time since Rotarians enjoyed such a forceful address as was delivered today at their luncheon by Captain Dancey, who is here on the mission of Americanization.

He took for his theme the "Sixth Object of Rotary" and in his logical talk he pictured the benefit of Rotary but did not overlook the opportunity to tell Rotarians that there are many who fail to understand the full meaning of the word. Then he took America as she stands today and pleaded for a better understanding; for overcoming the feeling that anything American is superior to the rest of the world, for he claimed with some emphasis that it is not physical supremacy nor its financial and commercial supremacy that will make a nation a world leader, but education. And education must not be understood to mean, the speaker said, as college work but it must be knowledge gained from daily life, from ex-

perience, from uplifting the heart and soul—a spiritual advancement. Tells of War Horrors

When the speaker touched on war he shuddered at the waste of war, intimated that were it not for business there would be no more wars and then he outlined the tenets of the American Legion, one of which was conscription of wealth and property as well as conscription of men in case of another conflict. This brought loud applause from the gathering.

Hank Manning, district governor of District No. 1, was an honored guest today and made a short talk just to get acquainted with the members. He will return later on a official visit. President John C. Boyle presided.

Fall-Sinclair Oil Case Is Postponed

WASHINGTON, May 13, (AP)—Trial of the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy case was postponed today in the District of Columbia supreme court from May 23 to October 17.

Continuance of the case was asked by government counsel so that further effort might be made to serve a subpoena on James P. O'Neill, former president of Prairie Gas company, described as a "pivotal" witness in the case.

DISCUSS TAXES ON PROPERTIES

County Assessor Presides At Meeting in County Court House

Taxation of business properties of Klamath Falls was discussed last night at a meeting of County Assessor W. T. Lee with property holders in the county court rooms. A tentative agreement was reached whereby Main and Sixth was named as the artery for a zone to run north and south. Property at this corner to be assessed at around \$275 a foot, to graduate thereafter in either direction.

Graduated Assessment

A suggestion made by M. Smith of Chilcote and Smith to count the first 25 feet in each block as the corner and to graduate thereafter, considering the property on either side as inside lots, met with the approval of the business men.

An appraisal committee, composed of W. D. Cofer, H. E. Peltz, D. M. Smith and R. E. Wattenburg named by the business men will meet this coming week with County Assessor Lee to go over the property and make appraisals.

Operating Income Postal Telegraph Small During 1926

SALEM, May 13, (AP)—The operating income of the Postal Telegraph company in Oregon for 1926 was \$4,045.09, according to its report to the public service commission. Other figures in the report are: operating revenue \$187,474.06; operating expenses, \$173,289.71; net operating revenue, \$14,184.35; uncollectible operating revenue, \$1,329.27; taxes, \$8,799.89; deductions from net operating revenue, \$19,930.16.

Alleged Wool Thief Escapes From Jail

PORTLAND, May 13, (AP)—Harry Graves, alias Wilson, who was arrested last month by Multnomah county deputy sheriffs and turned over to Morrow county officials on a charge of larceny of three bales of wool, escaped last night from the Heppner jail, where he was awaiting trial. A message giving this news was received today by Sheriff Hurlburt from Sheriff George McDuffee of Morrow county.

The wool was stolen from a Morrow county rancher. It was charged that Graves and a companion drove to Portland and attempted to dispose of it. Both were arrested. Sheriff R. T. Cookingham of Umatilla county also wanted the prisoner.
