CHAMPIONS DUEL FOR LEAGUE TOP

New York Maintains Monopoly on Crest of American and National

That duel of champions—between the winners of the world crown in 1925 and 1926—was on today in the National League with the St. Louis Cardinals again in second place and the Pirates back in third. The Giants still led the parade as New York retained its monopoly on the front rank of both leagues.

The Cardinals renewed their bid to repeat the title triumph of last year by knocking off the Phillies, 2 to 1, while the Pirates were losing to the Brooklyn Robins, 9 to 5.

As the Buccaneers dropped back in the ranking column, the lively Robins went up at their expense, taking sixth place, above the recumbent Reds and Braves. After a bad beginning, the Robins seem well on their way to a place among the contenders.

In the American League all three of the leaders won their latest games and widened the gap between themselves and the ruck.

New York stayed well out ahead of the field by beating a straggling Detroit team, 6 to 2.

The clash of the Red Sox and the White Sox was featured by the pitching of Ted Lyons, who thereby won his fifth victory of the season for the Chicago club, 5 to 2.

Four home runs helped the Athletics to their 10 to 8 decision over the Browns.

Swimming Champs Will Clash Again

TORONTO, Ont.—Ross Sommerville, of London, Ont., champion of the Canadian amateurs, and C. C. Fraser, of Montreal, whom he bested for the title last summer, are due for another links battle at the annual title hunt at the Ancaster club, near Hamilton, Ont., July 4-5.

The fight will be further enlivened by the entry of M. Scott, runner up to Fraser, when he won the crown in 1922 in the last championship staged at Ancaster. On that occasion Fraser rallied to win in 37 holes after being two down at the 34th. He lost that hole on a penalty for moving a piece of paper in a bunker.

CITY ABANDONS PAVING PROJECT

Refuses To Go Ahead With Pacific Terrace Section of Unit 65

Pacific Terrace section of paving unit 65 was abandoned and Portland avenue section may be held up until late summer or possibly next year, as the result of action of the city council last night.

Action came to a head when bids for the paving unit were submitted to the council. Instead of opening the offers, the council ordered them returned to the bidders and officially pronounced that Pacific Terrace could not be paved in 1927.

Reason for the action was because the assessed value could not be raised this year to meet the cost of the project. The valuation would have to be raised five times to meet the cost.

Portland avenue property, however, can stand the improvement, and it is the plan of the council to hold the original petitions and initiate the project independent of the Pacific Terrace section.

Lots Happened in Sixty Seconds for This Spokane Girl

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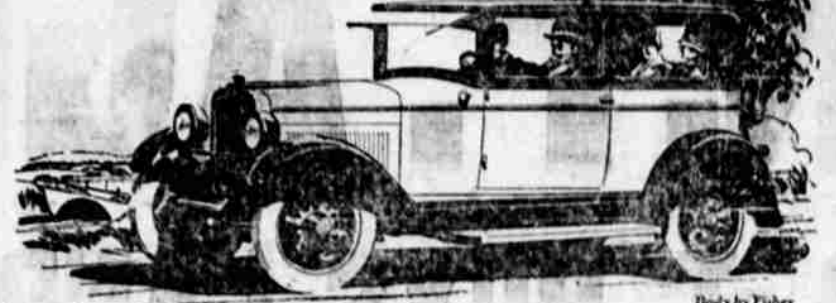
