

## MEMORIAL DAY PROGRAM LAID

Plans for the observance of Memorial Day in this city were completed last evening at a joint meeting of committees from the Spanish War Veterans, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Graves of Indians, Civil, Spanish and World War Veterans in the city cemetery will be decorated on Sunday, May 29. The ladies auxiliaries will assist the veterans in this duty.

On Monday morning, May 30, the parade will move from Link River bridge at ten o'clock. Preceding this there will be brief exercises at the bridge in memory of the naval dead and the scattering of flowers on the water by a bevy of school children.

The parade will be as follows: Grand Marshal, Captain O. C. Applegate and Indian War Veteran, Alden.

Klamath Falls Band. The Colors. Uniformed firing squad of the American Legion.

All children of public schools in the city. All Boy Scout troops of the city. DeMolay Drum Corps. Civil War Veterans. Spanish War Veterans. Veterans of Foreign Wars. American Legion.

The parade will move on Main street to tenth to the Central school where it is planned exercises will be held on the Central school grounds. If the weather is inclement, the parade will counter-march back to the American Legion building, where exercises will be held.

Speakers for the exercises at Link River bridge will be announced later.

The veterans are anxious that all business men cooperate in the flying of flags from their buildings and that street flags be displayed.

A special effort will be made to have all school children in the city schools out for the parade.

## SPRAGUE RIVER IS OVER BANKS

Both Boon and Nuisance to Farmers of Fertile Valley Of Eastern Klamath

Sprague river which is over its banks between Sprague River landing and Beatty, is both a boon and a nuisance to residents of eastern Klamath, according to Lee Haworth, progressive farmer of the valley, today.

"Bridge at Sprague River landing is impassable at this time," Mr. Haworth said; "at least impassable to automobiles. The approaches are under water and to get to Chilquin, one is now forced to go by way of Klamath Falls instead of the Beatty-Chilquin road."

But, Mr. Haworth pointed out, for the year, the flood conditions are also a great help to farmers.

### Gradual Inundation

"It is a gradual inundation," he explained, "and helps the valley. It isn't a flood in the true sense of the word; that is, the water is not sweeping through the valley taking everything with it. It is a quiet rise which renders the land more fertile and assures good foreign crops."

Mr. Haworth, on his 600 acre ranch is conducting crop experiments which may revolutionize agricultural endeavor in the Sprague river valley. Always a livestock center, Mr. Haworth sees possibilities in the country for diversified farming. He is receiving the cooperation of the county agent office and agricultural circles are awaiting with interest the outcome of the experiments.

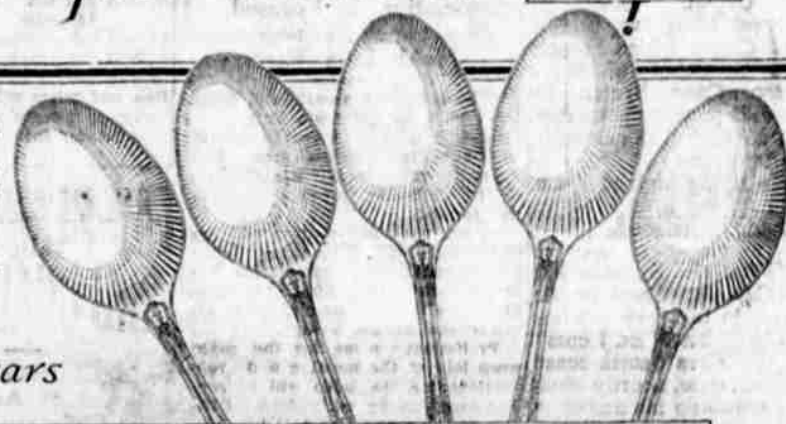
