O. C. & E. Buys Right of Way

The O. C. & E. has also been purchasing right-of-way properties through the Drew, Miller and Gerber ranches in Sprague river valley.

June 17, Vital Date
According to the Interstate commerce commission's last decision on the central Oregon railroad case, the three O. C. & E. extensions—Sprague river landing to Lakeview; Sprague river landing to Silver Lake; and Sprague river landing to the head of Williamson river—must be initiated by that road on or before June 17. The same order applied to construction by the Southern Pacific of the Modoc Northern railroad from Klamath Falls south to connect with the N. C. & E. railroad at Alturas, and to the Oregon Trunk in its proposed construction of the extension from Bend to Klamath Falls.

Thus, if the wholesale buying up of right-of-way for the Lakeview extension indicates immediate construction of that road, the I. C. C.'s mandate of last Saturday has in seven days meant the initiation of two of the proposed rail extensions which have been discussed and fought over during the past two years.

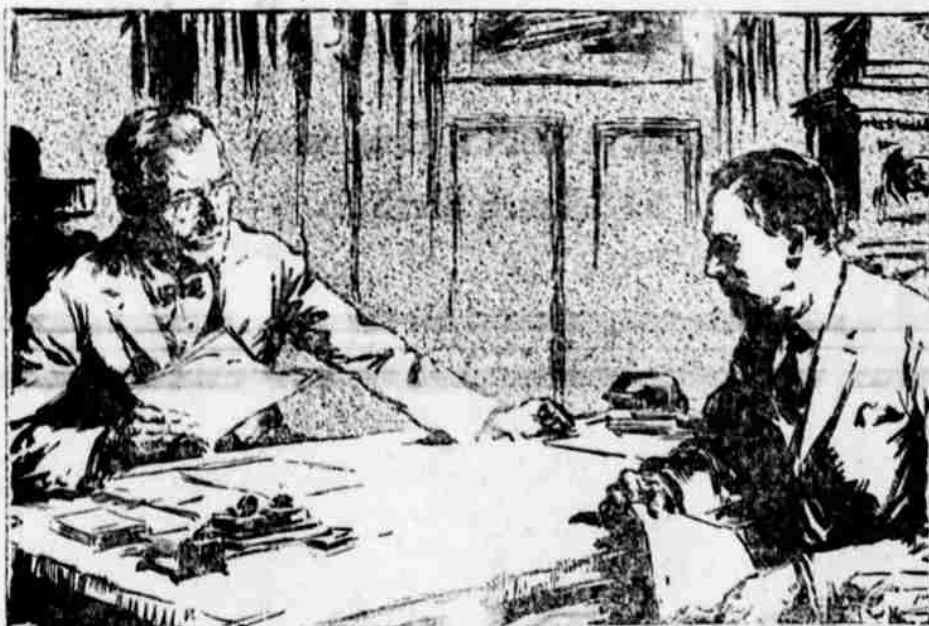
