



LOOSE INFIELD YANKEES STILL GIVES GAME TO LEADING; BABE BOAS YESTERDAY KNOCKS TENTH

Grants Pass Unable to Overcome Blow-up in Second; Score 7 to 6

MEDFORD, Ore., May 23. (AP).—The Boas of the southern Oregon League defeated Grants Pass at Ashland yesterday 7 to 6 in 13 innings. The winning run was scored on an error, steal of second, and a two base hit by Pitcher Davis after two were out. The Grants Pass infield went to pieces in the second and the Boas scored five runs before they settled down. In the fifth, Grants Pass tied the score with four hits and two errors. In the seventh they went into the lead when Pitcher Sharrock rapped out a long three bagger with a man on first. In the ninth the Boas tied the score on an error and a three bagger by Robins.

LOWER KLAMATH EGG TAKE SMALL

Cold Weather, Muddy Streams, Slow Up Run Of Spawning Trout

YREKA, Calif., May 23.—The rainbow trout spawning season is practically over, at least as far as the operations of the egg taking station maintained by the state fish and game commission at Beaver creek, 25 miles from here, is concerned, an inspection trip to the station disclosed.

Many difficulties in the taking of eggs have been encountered by James Stinnett and A. B. Marshall, fish culturists at the Beaver creek station this season.

Cold weather and high and muddy water in addition to heavy rains have slowed up the movement of the trout up Beaver creek and have handicapped the operation of the station, yet surprising results have been obtained.

More eggs have been taken at Beaver creek than at any other station maintained by the commission. It was disclosed. Nevertheless everything indicates a decided shortage of rainbow fry this season, according to the commission's reports.

Trout are trapped in an automatic device at Beaver creek. Coming up the fish ladder that has been constructed at the end of the concrete dam that has been placed in the creek just above the spawning house, the fish find themselves in a small pool with but one outlet, a pipe that leads to the separation pool in the spawning house.

Here the males and females are separated by hand and placed in two pools to rest and recover from the trip up the river. At the proper time the eggs are taken by Stinnett and Marshall, who work waist deep in water to do this work. The eggs are held over night and are shipped to the main hatchery at Mt. Shasta by the commission. Here the eggs are immediately placed in the trays to await hatching.

The Beaver creek egg taking station will close a successful season next week, despite the difficulties encountered this year, the employees explained.

Ingersoll is a fast man and has a wide reputation along the Coast. There are no dull moments while the Astorian is in the ring. Both boys have mixed it in the past.

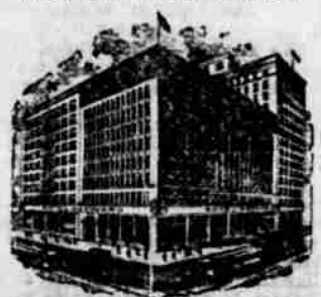
Fans Back Callahan. Klamath Falls fans are backing Callahan and look for their man to bring home the bacon.

Ever since George O'Brien was knee-high to a grasshopper he could defend himself with his hands. Dan O'Brien, police chief of San Francisco and father of the player, who is featured in "Havoc," at the Liberty Theatre, saw to that. One

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of the first presents he bought for his husky son was a pair of boxing gloves.

So it was that when George entered the naval service during the war he won the light heavyweight boxing title of the Pacific Coast when he defeated Sailor Bob Ferguson in four furious rounds.

When O'Brien left the service in 1919 his friends urged him to take up the ring profession seriously. It was before George thought of a motion picture career and the idea of the ring appealed to his athletic trend of mind. Gently, George broke the news to his family. His mother had a different idea on the subject. A mother's wish being law with O'Brien his hopes for glory in the squared circle quickly vanished into thin air.
