TRAFFIC SIGN MIX-UP

Where you see one eye, stop! Where there are two eyes, slow down!

This is the rule to follow in observing the new city traffic code. Warning signs, "red eyes," or whatever you want to call them, that are located in the center of Main street, and which have two red reflectors are merely to warn the motorist he is approaching a pedestrian thoroughfare across the intersection.

But on intersecting streets, where they join Main street, is a "red eye" with one reflector, and across the top of it is written "stop." Thus coming into a through street one must first stop; but driving on a through street, one must slow down only for pedestrian traffic at intersections.

Chop Suey

as the Chinese Make it

1 1/2 pounds round of beef or lean fresh pork	1 tablespoon Karo, Blue Label
1 1/2 tablespoons Argo or Kingstard's Cornstarch	5 tablespoons Mazola
2 cups coarsely diced celery	1 pt. bean sprouts optional (these may be purchased canned)
3 medium sized onions, sliced	Salt, pepper and Worcestershire Sauce to taste
	Boiled rice

CUT the meat in small cubes, dust with salt, pepper and the cornstarch and brown in the Mazola. Add the celery, onions, bean sprouts and Karo and simmer a few minutes. Half cover with boiling water and simmer until the meat is tender, about an hour. Season to taste with the Worcestershire Sauce. Serve with the boiled rice which has been pressed into custard cups to shape, then turned out. Boy sauce may be used instead of the Worcestershire. It can be obtained at Chinese restaurants.
