

ROAD MUST MAKE MOVE BY JUNE 17

River valley, and eight miles of right-of-way have been purchased in Drews and Goose Lake valleys.
With the dead line date set by the commission but 21 days off, and with the S. P.'s subsidiary rapidly acquiring rights of way,

construction of the eastern extension is believed to be almost assured. The road would connect with the Nevada, California and Eastern railroad, controlled by the Southern Pacific, would provide an eastern outlet, and would connect the Lakeview country with Klamath; more, it would bring Lakeview, often referred to as the country "Oregon forgot," into Oregon. Two other proposed extensions,

one north-east to Silver Lake and a second north to the headwaters of the Williamson river, are yet in question. Considerable doubt on whether the S. P. will initiate these extensions unless their hand is forced by Northern lines strategy, is expressed by those closely in contact with the railroad situation.

But the great question to the Klamath basin at this time, and also to the state of Oregon in general, is the construction of the Modoc Northern railroad.

Greatest Benefit.
This extension, which also comes under the June 17 ultimatum of the commission, would be of greatest benefit to the Klamath country with consequent lower freight rates.

Off the record, it is known that the Northern lines plan to push south into northern California to connect with the Western Pacific—either that or the Western Pacific will build north from Paction, Calif., to join with the Northern lines.

Will the Southern Pacific in the face of this intrusion on their territory, abandon the Modoc Northern?

Hardly, it is argued, for the Modoc Northern either to Alturas to connect with the N. C. & C. railroad or directly south, would be an effective argument against the invasion of northern California by the Northern lines.

But time is getting short, and despite a few rumors of right-of-way

negotiations, there have been no definite moves on the part of the Southern Pacific.

It is known that it is either one or the other, or maybe both. If S. P. abandons their southern extension, the Northern lines will lose no time in forging southward to meet the friendly Western Pacific.

Focus on S. P.
So the focus of the Central Oregon and Northern California railroad situation is now on the Southern Pacific.

In a few words, will the Southern Pacific:
1. Build their Modoc Northern railroad south-east to Alturas or will they build directly south to cut off the threatened invasion of the Northern lines?

2. Will the Northern lines, despite the Southern Pacific construction, force on south to meet the Western Pacific?

3. Will the Southern Pacific build its extension to Silver Lake and Williamson river—the Lakeview extension being almost assured?

4. In event the Southern Pacific decides to attempt to "stall" off the commission, will that body exercise its authority and deny the permits to the S. P. to build, thus allowing the Northern lines a free hand?

Altogether, it looks like June 17 will be a significant date in railroad history for Oregon and California.

Precinct No. 4: Olone, Polling place, Carpenter's Store Room. Judges, E. H. Moore, John Tiptoe, Hatlie Marshall.

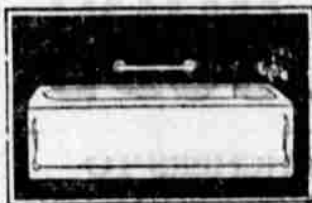
Precinct No. 5: Merrill, Polling place, Ned O'Connor's residence. Judges, M. P. Barry, W. E. Bailey and William Juinette.
