terday to the Evening Herald, the five scatter gun artists averaged between 184 birds and 189 birds out of 200.

Following are the scores: W. E. Lamm, 189; Charles Moore, 188; A. W. Schaupp, 184; Dr. W. R. Boyd, 184; and Everett Hardenbrook, 184.

Frank Trosh, Portland, lived up to his reputation by annexing the Pacific Coast championship with a score of 199 out of 200. There were over 125 entries.

INJUNCTION ON CONCERN LIFTED

Middle Fork Boom Co. Now Has Free Hand to Develop Properties

ROSEBURG, Ore., May 28. (AP)—The temporary injunction against the Middle Fork Boom company, operating logging camps along the middle fork of the Coquille river in Coos county, was lifted today by Judge Hamilton when the attorneys representing the parties concerned in the action announced that a satisfactory agreement had been reached.

The suit was one brought by A. L. Houghtelling and C. M. Parker against the Middle Fork Boom company to prevent logging operations along the stream. It being claimed that the splash dams used by the company to float logs caused excessive erosion along the banks of the river and damaged the property of the residents. Judge Hamilton held that dams constructed to create an artificial flow of the stream would make the company liable for damages and granted the petition for an injunction to restrain further operations. Since the decision was handed down the logging company has purchased right of way from the residents along the stream and have reached a satisfactory agreement, so that the order was made this morning lifting the injunction. The company plans to immediately reopen its camps which have been closed down during the time the case has been before the courts.

King of Fliers and 'Flying' King Shake Hands This Morning

BRUSSELS, Belgium, May 28. (AP)—King Albert of the Belgians received Captain Lindbergh at the royal palace this afternoon, two hours after the trans-Atlantic aviator had arrived here from Paris. It was a meeting of the flying king with the king of the fliers, the Belgian sovereign having spent many hours in the air. Lindbergh was also introduced to Queen Elizabeth, herself an aviation enthusiast, the duke and duchess of Brabant (the latter formerly Princess Astrid of Sweden) and all the other members of the royal household.
