grounds were attended by hundreds of local people, who stood with bared heads as the program was rendered.

The singing of "America" by the school children opened the outdoor services, the youngsters being led by the Klamath Falls band.

Outdoor Program
Rev. J. Henry Thomas gave the opening prayer, following which Rev. Frank A. Wemmett gave an inspiring patriotic address on the significance of the day. The speaker told of the origin of Memorial day, and of how it has become one of the most sacred days of the American people, whose intense loyalty prompts them to set aside this day in memory of those who have fought and died.

The Klamath Falls band rendered "Star Spangled Banner," the inspiring music being wafted on the gentle wind to nearby hills and valleys. Benediction was offered by Rev. A. F. Looser.

Another important ceremony in the general program of the day was the scattering of petals on the waters of Link River from the bridge this morning, as a tribute to the sailor dead.

The cemeteries were visited from early morning until early evening, with friends and relatives placing tributes of flowers on the mounds where loved ones lay sleeping.

Effective June 1, 1927, the undersigned meat markets will operate on a cash basis as follows:

All retail business will be for cash only.

Telephone orders will be taken, but deliveries will be c. o. d.

Deliveries will be at expense of consumers.

The City Delivery Service will make all deliveries and c. o. d. collections, collecting the price of the order, plus 10 cents delivery charge at time of making delivery.

The foregoing applies to all retail business and no exception will be made to the rule in any case.
