Miss Kintzel Enthuses Over City Schools

Miss Lenore Kintzel, Chautauqua Director, after visiting all of the public schools in Klamath Falls, states that the school system excels any of those which she is familiar with in the Eastern States.

Klamath Falls school children will stage a parade, Chautauqua Hooper Parade, next Saturday morning as a forerunner of the opening day of the Chautauqua season. Every child in the city is asked to meet on the Fremont school grounds at 9:00 Saturday morning, dressed to represent all Nations. There is room for any costume, be it a clown costume or that of a Negro or Indian. Anything to make the parade original and different.

The noonday luncheon clubs are to be the patrons of furnishing the prizes to be given. One to each school—the child to be chosen by Judges who will decide who did the best in make-up work in costumes worn during this parade.

The tent site is being donated by the School Board of Klamath Falls in order to save the guarantors the expense of renting a suitable space. This fact, is one appreciated by the committee and the committee joins the director in assuring the School Board of their gratitude for consideration. The grounds will be the Central school ground.

Sergeant Tells Of Advances In U. S. Ranks

In the opinion of Sergeant Jennings D. Lowman, United States Army Recruiting officer, the Army offers more opportunities than any business or profession in civil life today.

In speaking of the advantages, Sergeant Lowman brought out the retirement feature, where the soldier may retire on a pension of \$132.00 per month for the remainder of his life, many men at present retiring between the ages of 40 and 45. With this monthly income which is the equivalent of the interest of \$40,000 at 4 per cent. Any young man between the ages of 19 and 22, with a high school education or its equivalent may, after one year's service in the regular Army, take the entrance examination and if the results are satisfactory, be appointed to the United States Military Academy at West Point. Here he will be commissioned second Lieutenant of the branch selected.

111 Vacancies.

Each year, 111 vacancies are reserved at West Point for enlisted men of the regular Army.

The Army brings an education in itself to every man who enlists, most any trade can be learned and this is limited only to the ambitions of the man.

That the sun never sets on the United States Army is quite true, according to Sergeant Lowman who points out the stations in United States, Porto Rico, Panama, Hawaii, the Philippine Islands, China and Alaska.

During the past month five men have been enlisted from the Portland station who are to be sent to try for West Point, six for a commission.

A former assistant to the Collector of Customs at Marshfield, making a salary of \$200 a month, gave up his position to try for this advancement.

Sergeant Lowman is stationed in the Court House and will be glad to get in touch with any young men interested in learning more of the opportunities to be gained from enlisting.

Examination to Be Held for Position Prohibition Investigator

For the first time since the bill passed Congress placing prohibition investigators under the direction of postal rulings, an examination will be held in Klamath Falls on Saturday, June fourth.

Along with the examination for prohibition investigator, which is most rigid, an examination for inspector will be held, according to Assistant Postmaster, R. L. Griffith.

With the passing of this bill by Congress, the position is taken out of the political class and the rigid examination is bound to bring men of higher type and education into such positions, in the opinion of Mr. Griffith.

The local office is awaiting instructions as to where the examination will be held and by whom.

PAIR KILLED IN HOLIDAY PARADE

NEW YORK, June 1. (AP)—Two black-shirted followers of the fascists on their way to march in a Memorial day parade were killed today by unknown assailants at 183rd Street and Third Avenue. The victims, Joseph Carisi, a tailor, and Nicholas Amoroso, a printer, were stabbed and shot.

Their assailants, witnesses told the police, wore red ties, signifying their allegiance to the Italian nationalist party.

Carisi's body, bleeding from 15 stab wounds was found a few feet from the "L" station which both of the men apparently had intended to enter.
