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Wool Buying Active In Lakeview; Price Between 28 and 29

LAKEVIEW, Ore., June 2—Activity in wool buying came suddenly to the fore here yesterday and today when representatives of Koshland and company and Elsmann and company of Boston, Mass., purchased 29,000 fleeces at prices ranging from 28 1/2 cents to 29 cents a pound.

Buying was initiated by Elsmann company which yesterday purchased approximately 16,000 fleeces at 28 1/2 and 28 3/4 cents a pound.

Koshland company entered the field late yesterday afternoon and this morning, purchasing approximately 16,000 fleeces at 29 cents a pound.

Interest of the eastern manufacturers in the Lake county wool clip has caused much speculation as to future prices.

Buying will hold all stakes and side bets—if any are made.

California Road Body Will Probe Road Conditions

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2. (AP)—The itinerary of the state highway commission, on its inspection tour of the Northern California highways, which began yesterday, provides for trips as far north as Medford, Ore., and thorough inspection of the roads throughout the northern section of the state. Inspection of the Klamath river bridge will be on Saturday's program. The party will lunch at Crescent City and later inspect route 71 to the Oregon line.

Sunday the commission will journey to Medford, Ore., to meet Oregon Highway Commissioner Gates, and will return to Yreka the same day, with side trips down the Klamath river and back.
