Chamberlin Ready For Longer Flight

NEW YORK, June 3. (U. P.)—A non-stop flight which will eclipse in point of time and distance the achievement of Captain Charles A. Lindbergh, will be attempted by Clarence Chamberlin and an unnamed navigator in the Bellanca monoplane, Columbia, as soon as favorable weather reports are received.

The plane is that in which Chamberlin and Bert Acosta recently broke the world's record for sustained flight and its owner and pilot declared that Berlin or Rome might be the goal.

C. A. Levine, whose quarrel with Lloyd Bertand, mail service pilot, interfered with the Bellanca plane's proposed flight to Paris last month, owns the Columbia and he and Chamberlin plan a trans-Atlantic hop to some European capital more distant than Paris.

Mrs. Vanderbilt Granted Divorce

PARIS, June 3. (AP)—Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt, 2nd, the former Virginia Fair, was granted a decree of divorce today. The judg-

ment says Mr. Vanderbilt drove his wife from their conjugal domicile and showed himself excessively cold toward her.

Mrs. Vanderbilt is given the custody of their son, William K. Vanderbilt III. The judgment makes no mention of any financial settlement, the plaintiff not having asked for alimony.

Mrs. Vanderbilt's divorce plea and a countersuit by her husband were filed with the Paris court on April 23, the wife charging that she had been refused access to their domicile in Paris, and the husband pleading the wife's coldness of disposition.

Mr. Vanderbilt raised no objections to his wife's petition for custody of their son, William K. Vanderbilt III, during the formal pleadings, and the court granted her request. No application was made for alimony.

Trout Fishing on Merced Excellent

YOSEMITE, Calif., June 3. (U. P.)—"Just one jump from the Merced river to the trying pan at Camp Curry," laughed Jack Greener, champion fisherman of Yosemite valley.

He proves his assertion by handling Fritz, Camp Curry's chef, a seven pound German Brown trout measuring twenty-six inches in

length. He also landed two smaller fish, making the state weight limit. This is a record catch here to date.

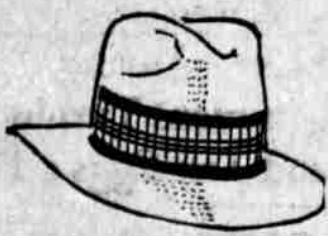
