It will be used on the regular run between Klamath and Medford by the Howard Transportation company.

The hotel is of brick construction and has 42 rooms, all on the second floor, with a small but cozy lobby on the main floor. It was erected by the Kern brothers, widely known Klamath property owners.

Material and labor from Klamath were utilized in the construction of the building wherever possible. The roofing is the Johns-Manville Asbestos roofing and was installed by the Miller Construction company. This concern also furnished the sand, rock and gravel for the concrete work.

The Superior Laundry will take care of the laundry for the hotel, and the Ostendorf Motor company has been designated as the official garage by Mr. and Mrs. Brookfield. The matter of dry cleaning travel-stained clothing for the guests of the new hostelry will be taken care of by the Kapital Cleaners, who are located at 195 South Seventh street.

ignore and called for courageous leadership such as Andrew Jackson might display.

Practical Issue

"Prohibition is a practical issue of the most vital kind in which the whole country is intensely interested and upon which it is looking eagerly for courageous leadership," he said. "The question is interwoven with some of the deepest, and most challenging tendencies now at work in American life and which it is the imperative duty of responsible statesmanship to combat."

"The attack on the eighteenth amendment is but a part of a great movement which menaces all that is most American in our institutions. It is the fighting front of a conflict that is deeper than the liquor question. The conflict is, shall the constitution be nullified or shall it be enforced?"

Cannot Ignore

"But the liquor question itself is a question that political leadership cannot ignore. The American people, by writing the eighteenth amendment into the constitution, registered the conviction that the welfare of the nation demanded that they should be protected from exploitation by a traffic that took toll from millions of innocent persons, women and children for the most part, who were sacrificed to its financial greed."

"The liquor interests naturally resisted and their resistance has grown to the point where they have succeeded in inducing certain states to nullify the constitution and now are pressing forward to gain control of the federal government itself in order to paralyze prohibition enforcement."

"If free government means anything, it means precisely that issues of this kind should form the basis of party contests and popular decisions."

Receipts for Air Mail Show Big Increase

With the fiscal year ending in April, 1927, the total receipts on air mail had reached \$1,970,248.19 with more than 367,632 pounds shipped via the air route, according to statistics shown at the office of Postmaster John A. McCall. In the establishment of the air mail service the post office department spent \$15,000,000, according to figures compiled.

That the Western states appear to find the air mail service of more value than Eastern states in proportion to the population is evidenced in the receipts shown. Between Salt Lake and Los Angeles the air mail carried 9,500 pounds of letters during the best month or an average of 13.63 pounds to every 1000 persons. The route from New York to Boston carried 2000 pounds, making an average of less than 1-3 pound to every 1000 persons.
