Preparation to care for the flood of air mail greetings to welcome Lindbergh, expected to result from the promise of Postmaster General New to see that the courageous air mail pilot gets every air mail letter addressed in his care, were being expedited today by Postmaster John A. McCall. Extra planes and pilots are being held in readiness by the Pacific Air Transport at strategic locations along the Coast to rush the congratulatory messages to the transcontinental planes. Air mail letters should be addressed to Captain Charles A. Lindbergh, care of the Postmaster General, Washington, D. C., marked "air mail" and bear ten cents postage. They may be dropped in any air mail box. Distinctive air mail stamps are not necessary but should be used where possible and may be obtained at the post office.
